## Boe takes biathlon gold after Fourcade's stunning collapse

Martin Fourcade's rare collapse on the final shoot of the 20-kilometer individual race handed Norwegian rival Johannes Thingnes Boe his first Olympic gold medal in biathlon on Thursday.

Fourcade, the world's top-ranked biathlete and already a gold medalist at the Pyeongchang Games, shockingly missed his final two targets.

"That was like a gift," Boe said. "Even if he had only missed one of the last two shots he would have been the winner."

Fourcade appeared to have victory in his sights after making his first 18 shots and building a 90-second lead over the rest of the field. But the Frenchman rolled his eyes in disgust after missing two straight shots and then furiously skied to the finish line in an attempt to salvage a medal but wound up fifth.

Jakov Fak of Slovenia took home silver, and Dominik Landertinger of Austria captured the bronze after battling back from back surgery in September. Both had clean shoots.

Boe is second in the World Cup standings and has been Fourcade's chief rival this season.

He also missed two shots in the race, but finally found the podium after two disappointing performances in his first two events in Pyeongchang. Boe had participated in seven previous events at the Winter Games but had yet to win a medal.

Boe, who appropriately used a golden rifle, couldn't hold back his tears as the race ended.

"Amazing," Boe said of the feeling, knowing he can't celebrate too long. "I know (Fourcade) will be taking his frustration out in the mass start and will be hard to beat."

Fak is only the second Slovenian athlete to win a medal in biathlon at the Winter Games. Teja Gregorin won bronze in the women's 10-kilometer pursuit in 2014.

There was drama in the women's 15-kilometer race, too.

Hanna Oeberg pulled off a shock by beating two-time gold medalist Laura Dahlmeier by hitting all 20 targets with her

# What to watch from the Pyeongchang Olympics on Day 7

**PYEONGCHANG**, South Korea (AP) — Happy New Year! South Korea is celebrating its biggest holiday Friday with fireworks, cultural events and more curling. There will be lots of other Olympic feats of greatness. Here's what to look for (all times Eastern):

### FIGURE SKATING

Prime time means prime competition and on Friday night that means the men's free skate. There are many strong contenders, including Canadian veteran Patrick Chan, but be sure to watch the young U.S. star Nathan Chen. Chen's athleticism is unrivaled on the ice. The 18-year-old has been hitting five quadruple jumps in his long program this year, meaning he has the power to make four full rotations five times in about 4½ minutes. That said, the daring moves can cost him if he falls. Also watch fellow American Adam Rippon, who raised his star power by taking on Vice President Mike Pence's stance on gay rights.

### ALPINE

The women's super-G will go at 9 p.m. but without U.S. star Mikaela Shiffrin. After suggesting she might compete in all five events in Pyeongchang, the gold medal winner pulled out, citing the compressed schedule for alpine racing. High winds pushed back early races and forced cancellations. Like the downhill, the super-G is considered a speed race because the gates are spaced far enough apart for the skier to really pick up speed. Watch for the skiers to carve turns around gates of two poles and a flag. It is the distance between gates — and subsequent breakneck speeds — that distinguish this event from the more technical slalom and giant slalom.

### CURLING

Competition in curling is still going strong. In fact, curling is the only event that is played every day during the Olympics, which is a good thing because the sweeping, shouting, stone-throwing, crazy-pants-wearing teams become cult favorites every four years. The women play a round just after midnight. The men play at 6:05 a.m., when the U.S. men face Denmark and the Canadians face host South Korea. The U.S. women will face Russia at 7:05 p.m. Japan and Sweden are topping the standings for the women, while over on the men's side, Canada is continuing its curling domination, along with Sweden and Great Britain.

### ICE HOCKEY

At 10:10 p.m., the women will see a playoff quarterfinal between the Russians and Switzerland. The winner of that match will face the defending champions Canada. Men's preliminary rounds continue with the Russians playing Slovenia at 2:40 a.m. and two games at 7:10 a.m.: Finland against Norway

and Sweden against Germany. At 10:10 p.m., Canada faces the Czech Republic.

### FREESTYLE SKIING

For the thrill seekers, there is women's freestyle skiing to watch. The slopestyle finals start at 11 p.m. Each skier will have three runs down a course of jumps and rails, performing tricks to rack up points. Judging is subjective, with a team of judges looking at height, difficulty, variety and execution. The aerials finals start at 6 a.m. Watch for the women to launch themselves off large jumps, perform a seemingly impossible series of flips and rotations and hopefully land on their skis. Scoring is based on a complex formula that includes takeoff, form and landing. Watch how the women extend their bodies on takeoff to get more height.

### CROSS-COUNTRY SKIING

The men's 15-kilometer freestyle event starts at 1 a.m. Racers start in 30-second intervals, and the one with the

best overall time wins. Cross-country skiing uses two techniques, classic and freestyle. The freestyle is more similar to skating than the classic gliding. This event is dominated by Nordic skiers, but watch for the bare-chested Tongan! The taekwondo athlete became internet famous for walking into the Rio Olympics opening ceremony without a shirt, greased up with coconut oil. He wore the same thing for the frigid opening in Pyeongchang. Just happy to be here, he has set a very personal definition of success in this event, which is "don't ski into a tree." He is expected to wear clothes, though.

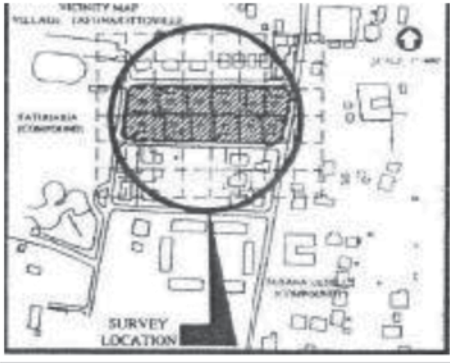
### SPEEDSKATING

Another day at the oval, another chance for the Dutch to show their world domination in speedskating. They have won every speedskating gold medal in Pyeongchang except for the men's 10,000 meters, which was earned by Netherlands-born Canadian Ted-Jan.

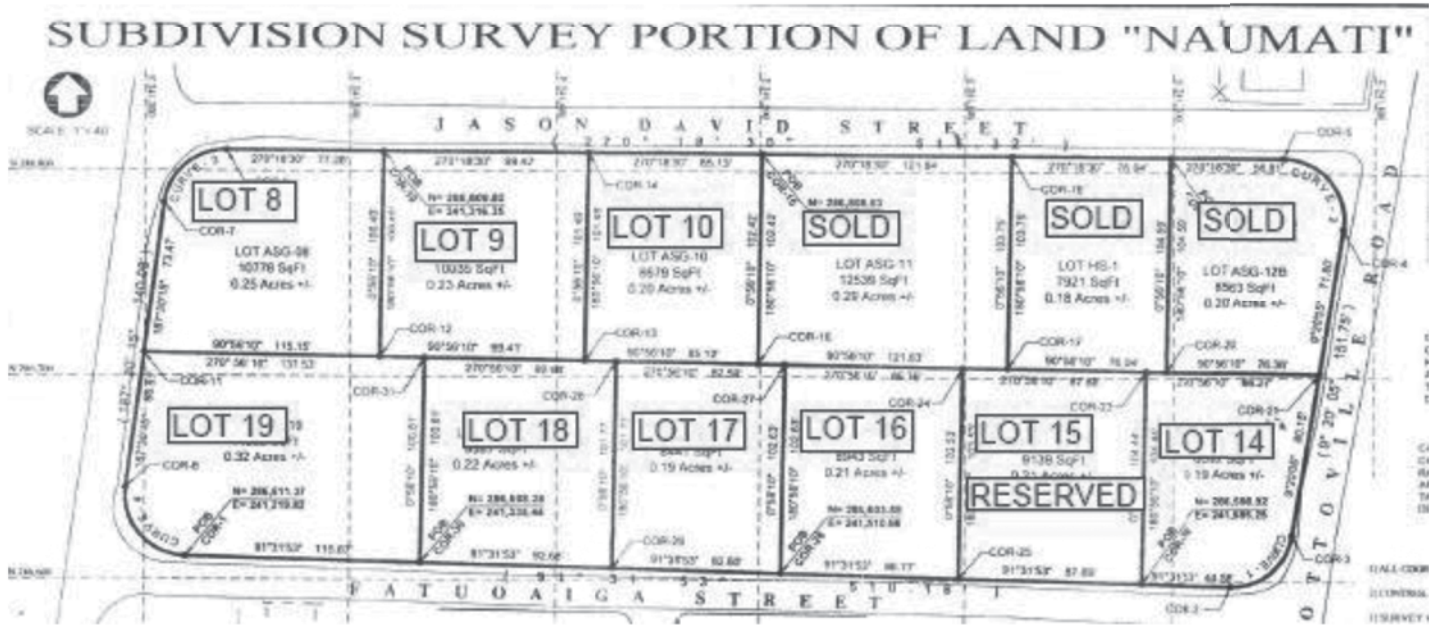

# Happ's double-double leads Wisconsin over No. 6 Purdue

MADISON, Wis. (AP) — Ethan Happ made his mentor proud.

On a night when Wisconsin honored Frank Kaminsky, one of the best players in program history, Happ led the current crop of Badgers to their biggest win of a challenging season.

Happ finished with 21 points and 12 rebounds after the school retired Kaminsky's jersey, and Wisconsin beat No. 6 Purdue 57-53 on Thursday to hand the Boilermakers their third straight loss.

Carsen Edwards, who finished with 22 points, missed a 3 with 12 seconds left to end Purdue's comeback hopes. Wisconsin's Brevin Pritzl went 3 of 4 from the foul line over the final 19 seconds to seal a win so big in Madison that fans rushed the court after the final buzzer — including Kaminsky.

It felt like 2015 again, when

Kaminsky led the Badgers to the national championship game as a senior.

"You want to say 'thanks' to Frank and 'thanks' to all the alumni? The best way to show your respect ... go out and play really well," coach Greg Gard said.

Happ didn't play that season as a redshirt, but he did practice against Kaminsky every day. Those afternoons trading elbows in the paint and learning moves from Kaminsky have paid off — to the point where Happ passed his role model for 11th place on the school's career scoring list on Thursday.

"It's funny how life works sometimes, to have this be the game with Frank, who taught me so much," Happ said. "It's very special to do that."

The Boilermakers had seemingly overcome early offensive hiccups after a 10-0 run gave them a 39-32 lead with 9:37 left when Wisconsin (12-16, 5-10

Big Ten) answered with aggressive play sparked by freshman guard Brad Davison (16 points).

It was a debilitating loss for Purdue's chances of winning the league. The Boilermakers (23-5, 12-3) are struggling with the conference tournament just a couple weeks away.

"We're a team that has to have good balance in our jump-shooting, coming off screens," coach Matt Painter said. "It was one of those games where things weren't going your way. You had to grind it out."

A choppy first half ended with a 21-all tie after the teams combined to miss 37 shots.

## BIG PICTURE

Purdue: The Boilermakers were lucky to be tied at halftime after laboring through a scoring drought of 8:17. Seven of their first 13 turnovers came in the game's first 16-plus minutes. Their offensive woes continued after coming into the night having been held to less than 65 points for two straight games for the first time since 2014-15.

"It's a head-scratcher at this point," forward Vince Edwards said about the losing streak. "We've got to figure out something."

Wisconsin: Young players have been thrust into bigger-than-expected roles because of injuries this season, but they put together a complete game against one of its toughest opponents of the year. The Badgers have had games when they've played well for one half, only to get blown out in the other, or vice versa. This game represented an important step forward for Gard's club.

"This team has had a lot of potential all year, and we've been coming up short in a lot of games," Davison said. "A lot of people have given up on us going into the end of the year, but we haven't given up on ourselves."

## ETHAN HAPPENS

Seven-foot-2 center Isaac Haas, who had 12 points and 11 rebounds, made Happ work on offense. The 6-10 Happ was 9 of 20 before fouling out with 21 seconds remaining, but not before adjusting in the second half by taking more angles against Haas instead of trying to shoot over him.

## BOILERS DOWN

Purdue shot 39 percent (19 of 48) on the night, but 23 percent (4 of 17) from the 3-point line. They were just 1 of 7 from the arc in the second half.

Painter said the misses seemed to affect his team's play in other areas.

"We got stops and then we didn't get the rebound and they got second-chance points, and they scored off turnovers in the first half — that's the frustrating part," Edwards said.

## ON GARD

Gard secured his sixth win against a Top 10 team in his two-plus seasons since succeeding Bo Ryan.



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# Shiffrin skis again and men's figure skating gets underway

PYEONGCHANG, South Korea (AP) — American Mikaela Shiffrin is set to compete in the women's slalom for what would be her second gold medal of the Pyeongchang Olympics, and Norwegian Aksel Lund Svindal will go for a second medal, in the men's super-G, as Day 7 gets

underway. Both skiers won medals Thursday, Shiffrin in the giant slalom and Svindal in the men's downhill. Both races had been scheduled for earlier in the games but were delayed due to high winds. Also Friday, the men's figure-skating competition starts with

the short program. Medals will be awarded after the free skate Saturday. Reigning Olympic champion Yuzuru Hanyu of Japan will be the first skater in the final group, followed by American star Nathan Chen, Russian skater Mikhail Kolyada and countryman Shoma Uno.

Port Administration employees, along with workers from other ASG agencies and the private sector who work on the main dock, were evacuated to the other side of the street.

The incident caused traffic to backup in the town area and the port was re-opened less than 30 minutes later.

During the port shutdown, Port Administration director Taimalelagi Dr. Claire Poumele told Samoa News those first responders, including police, were working on identifying the source of the ammonia leak. Responding to Samoa News inquiries, about an hour after the port re-opened, Taimalelagi said the ammonia leak was on the Captain Vincent Gann purse seiner fishing boat — which was docked at the port.

“All that has been confirmed is that it was in their Engine Room. The Harbor Master has informed them to move to another assigned area,” she explained. “Our Port Security is conducting an inspection and will provide a full report soon.”

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# Yun's the one: South Korea gets men's skeleton Olympic gold

PYEONGCHANG, South Korea (AP) — Yun Sungbin left no doubt. It's his track. It's his gold medal.

The most decisive Olympic skeleton champion ever is a 23-year-old who had no idea what he was doing on a sled a few years ago and now stands taller than anyone else in the sport.

Yun won in commanding fashion at the Pyeongchang Games on Friday, his four-run time of 3 minutes, 20.55 seconds easily coming in 1.63 seconds ahead of silver medalist Nikita Tregubov of Russia. Most skeleton races are decided by tenths or hundredths of a second, but Yun was dominant from start to finish — the fastest slider, in every way, in every heat.

He stepped onto the award podium shortly after finishing, arms skyward as thousands of his fellow South Koreans roared. They showed up early on a bright morning in the Taebaek Mountains, fully expecting to see the sort of dominance he himself envisioned when taking thousands of training runs on the track that was built for these Olympics, the track he knows better than anyone else

in sliding.

“Yun! Sung! Bin!” they chanted, over and over. “Yun! Sung! Bin!”

Yun delivered.

Happy New Year, indeed. On a national holiday in Korea — the start of a lunar new year — Yun became a national hero. He is the reigning World Cup overall champion, is now the Olympic champion and his career is only just starting.

“If you see the Korean guy, he has the best material,” Spain’s Ander Mirambell said. “He will win this easy.”

It was the biggest victory margin in Olympic skeleton, topping 1948 when Italy’s Nino Bibbia topped Jack Heaton of the U.S. by 1.4 seconds in a six-heat race.

The only drama in the final heat was who would finish second. Tregubov won that battle, edging Dom Parsons of Britain. Latvia’s Martins Dukurs, the winningest World Cup men’s skeleton racer in history, struggled in the final run and slipped to fourth.

For the U.S., 2014 Olympic bronze medalist Matt Antoine was 11th and three-time Olympian John Daly was 16th.

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## Ratings slide a bit for NBC; the West Coast has advantage

NEW YORK (AP) — Highlights from media coverage of the Pyeongchang Olympics:

**RATINGS:** If the ratings were an Olympic race, NBC slipped a few seconds off its pace on Wednesday. The Nielsen company said 19.2 million people watched competition in prime time on NBC, the cable network NBCSN and through streaming services, down 8 percent from the 20.8 million who watched NBC for the corresponding night at the Sochi Olympics four years ago. An estimated 17.2 million watched NBC alone, or 17 percent off Sochi.**PRIME TIME PLUS:** NBC decided this year to air its Olympic telecast at the same time across the country, and that paid off for West Coast viewers in the U.S. with Thursday's competition in Korea. They were able to see Mikaela Shiffrin win her giant slalom gold medal live in a prime viewing window, right before 10 p.m. Pacific on Wednesday. In past years, West Coast viewers were stuck watching reruns of an East Coast feed that aired three hours earlier. **TRYING AGAIN:** NBC prepared a strong feature on American snowboarder Lindsey Jacobellis, a four-time Olympian sadly known best to many for falling while making an unnecessary jump at the end of a race she was dominating, costing her a sure gold medal in the 2006 Turin Games. Curiously, producers aired it around 1 a.m. Thursday on the East Coast, right before a men's qualifying round in snowboarding.

# Stith's big night leads Monarchs to rout of Roadrunners

NORFOLK, Va. (AP) — B.J. Stith poured in a career-high 36 points to go with 10 rebounds and Xavier Green added 17 points as Old Dominion blew out UTSA 100-62 on Thursday night.

The win marked the Monarchs' (20-5, 11-2 Conference-USA) eighth in their last nine games, as they will maintain at least a share of second place in the conference.

Old Dominion raced out to a big lead immediately, going on 23-9 run to start it, with Stith hitting three 3-pointers and scoring 13. After the Roadrunners (14-12, 7-6) hit two 3-pointers to cut the lead within eight, the Monarchs rode a 14-3 run to a 52-36 halftime lead.

The Monarchs quickly shut the door on any UTSA comeback hopes by opening the second half on a 16-3 run to push their lead to 29. Marquise Godwin's 3-pointer with 1:24 put the Monarchs over the century mark, the first time they have reached that milestone this season.

Jhivvan Jackson scored 22 points with five 3-pointers and Deon Lyle added 18 points with five 3s for the Roadrunners.

## Carr, Watkins lead Penn State over No. 8 Ohio State

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa. (AP) — Tony Carr scored 30 points and Penn State routed No. 8 Ohio State 79-56 on Thursday night to sweep the Buckeyes.

Mike Watkins added 11 points and 10 rebounds for his tenth double-double of the season, and Shep Garner and Josh Reaves added 13 and 10 points apiece for the Nittany Lions (19-9, 9-6 Big Ten), who won their sixth in seven tries since beating the Buckeyes in Columbus on Jan. 25.

C.J. Jackson led Ohio State (22-6, 13-2) with 13 points and Keita Bates-Diop added 10 for the Buckeyes, who had their four-game winning streak snapped.

The Nittany Lions took control in the first half with a 12-0 run over 5:06 as the Buckeyes went 0-for-5 in that span.

Carr tossed an alley-oop Watkins' way and the forward jammed home the run's second basket to give Penn State the lead for good just 3:20 in.

Penn State added a pair of 7-0 runs and a 6-0 spurt later in the half and Carr buried an awkward layup off a full-court inbounds pass and an ensuing free throw to give Penn State a 45-21 halftime lead.

The Buckeyes trailed by as many as 30 early

in the second but used an 18-4 run to cut Penn State's lead to 16 with 10:32 to play. Bates-Diop hit a 3-pointer to pull the Buckeyes to 58-42 but they wouldn't get any closer.

### THE BIG PICTURE

Ohio State: The Buckeyes entered a half game up on No. 2 Michigan State in the Big Ten standings and a 1½ ahead of No. 6 Purdue with the head-to-head tiebreaker over both. The Boiler-makers fell to Wisconsin on Thursday, so they didn't gain any ground. But the Buckeyes' lead isn't safe with three games left, especially if they shoot as poorly as they did inside the Bryce Jordan Center where they made just 28 percent of their field goals over the first 20 minutes.

Penn State: The Nittany Lions controlled this game from the opening tip thanks to stingy defense that turned into opportunistic offense. They improved to 2-2 against ranked teams this season. Now, the Nittany Lions will have a chance to beat ranked foes in back-to-back games for the first time since Jan. 2011 when the Nittany Lions beat No. 18 Michigan State and No. 16 Illinois consecutively.

## Charleston Southern pulls away to win 77-65

FARMVILLE, Va. (AP) — Cortez Mitchell scored 17 points and Christian Keeling added 15 to lead Charleston Southern over Longwood 77-65 on Thursday night.

Travis McConico added 14 points and Jordan Jones 10 for the Buccaneers (12-14, 7-8 Big South), who swept the season series from the Lancers (6-22, 3-12). Charleston Southern

was only 3 of 12 from the arc but outscored Longwood 46-28 in the paint even though out-rebounded 40-39.

Trailing by two at half-time, the Buccaneers got 11 points each from Mitchell and McConico in the second half with a 9-0 run capped by five straight points from Phlandrous Fleming snapping a 50-all tie. A jumper from Cortez with

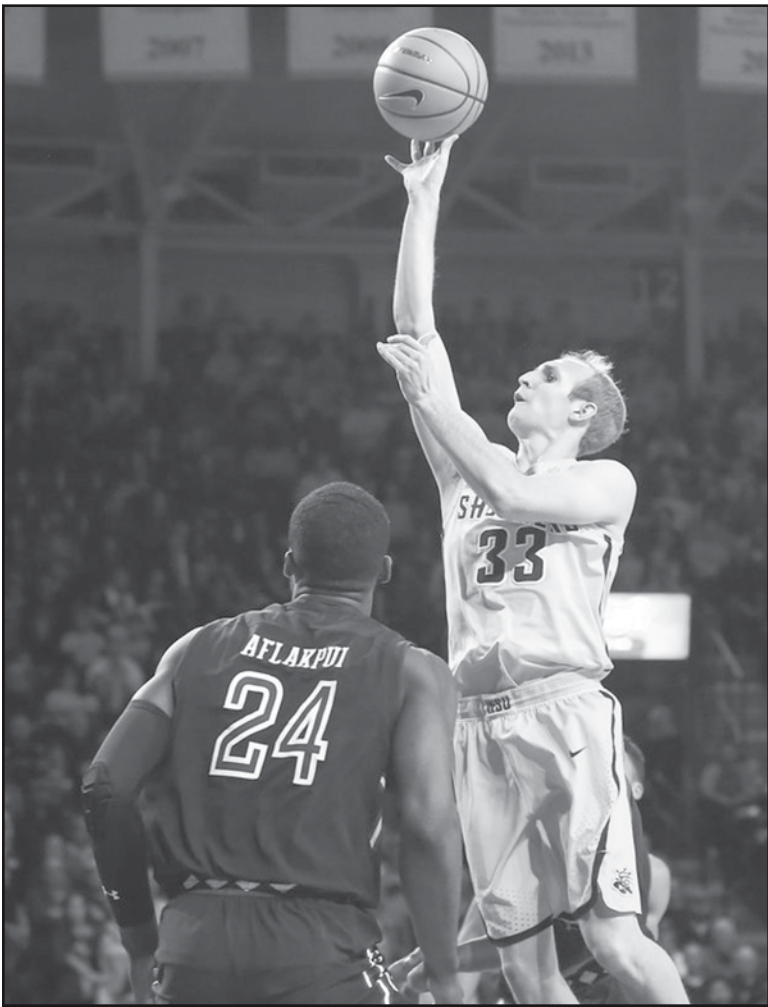
3:09 remaining gave Charleston Southern a double-digit lead for good at 69-58.

# Morris leads No. 19 Wichita State past Temple 93-86

WICHITA, Kan. (AP) — As his teammates headed to the locker room after allowing 56 first-half points, Wichita State senior center Shaquille Morris witnessed their frustration.

And he saw opportunity. Would No. 19 Wichita State allow Temple to beat the Shockers for a second time in 15 days? Or would Wichita State storm back?

After the Shockers' 93-86 victory Thursday, thanks in large part to Morris' 23 points and 13 rebounds, he had his answer.

"Tonight defined our team," Morris said. "We've gotten better.

"We needed a game like this, especially being down second half and showing resilience."

Darral Willis had 24 points for the Shockers (20-5, 10-3 American Athletic Conference). Morris and Willis, senior big men, were combined 18 of 21 from the floor.

"We rode them," Shockers coach Gregg Marshall said. "When they play like that, you can ride them."

Austin Reaves scored 11 points for Wichita State, and Landry Shamet and Conner Frankamp each scored 10.

Temple (15-11, 7-7) hit a season-high 16 3-point shots on 29 attempts. Obi Enechionya led Temple with 17 points and other Owls were in double figures — Quinton Rose (16), De'Vondre Perry (15), Shizz Alston (15) and Josh Brown (13).

Temple brought a five-game winning streak into the game

and was hot in the first half. The Owls were 11 of 15 from the 3-point line while building that 56-42 halftime lead.

Enechionya spurred the offensive outburst, hitting three 3-pointers and scoring 11 points in a 13-7 run the start the game. He entered the game averaging 11.1 points.

"Obi really got us started," Temple coach Fran Dunphy said. "I don't think we could have played any better offensively in the first half."

Shamet acknowledged he was "pretty frustrated" at half-time. "You don't want to be getting beat like that at home," he said. "It was like we couldn't find an answer."

Wichita State did after half-time, opening with an 11-0 run and eventually taking its first lead, 66-62, on a Willis 3-pointer with 11:31 to play.

"We made some coaching tweaks," Marshall said, "but it was really just about finding a way."

Morris did much of the damage with 16 points and eight rebounds in the second half. Dunphy credited Morris with "having a basketball IQ off the charts."

Morris' putback resulting in a three-point play with 1:54 remaining gave Wichita State an 84-81 lead it would not lose. The Shockers outscored the Owls 36-8 in the in the paint.

"Stickbacks killed us," Dunphy said.

Marshall said Morris diving in a pile of players to retrieve the ball, resulting in a Conner Frankamp layup, showed him more than any other play.

"This might have been

Shaq's finest game as a Shocker," Marshall said. "He was a beast."

### BIG PICTURE

Temple: The Owls backed up their hot streak, going toe to toe on the road with a top-20 team in a crazy environment.

Wichita State: The Shockers overcame a huge deficit to beat a hot opponent and, combined with Cincinnati's loss, get back in the conference race.

### COACHING VOICE

Dunphy has been to more than his share of arenas, but Thursday was his first game at Koch Arena.

"You hear a lot about it, and it's a special place," Dunphy said. "Late in the game, we were trying to get our guys to come off the center line to press. We had no chance of them hearing us."

Marshall said it was "the loudest Koch Arena has been in many a year."

### SHAMET HELPING

Shamet had five assists, giving him 252 for his career. He is just the third Shocker to reach 250 before the end of his sophomore season, joining Fred VanVleet (282) and Joe Griffin (306).

### UP NEXT

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# Bieber, LeBron, other stars descend on LA for NBA showcase

The stars will be out in Los Angeles, on the basketball court and all around it.

The NBA's All-Star festivities are back at Staples Center, with the usual events on All-Star Saturday night and a new format for the game Sunday.

Captains LeBron James and Stephen Curry drafted players from the pool of All-Stars and the winning team gets a \$350,000 donation from the NBA to the charity it chose. The league is hoping the new format that replaced the traditional East-West matchup will make it more competitive after a couple of lackluster games the previous two years.

Perhaps the players can heed the words of Kobe Bryant, who won the MVP award on his home floor when the All-Star Game was last in Los Angeles in 2011.

"I feel like we have a sense of responsibility and we are voted in for what we do during the season, which is play hard," Bryant said following that game. "And we come here, that's what the fans want to see. They want to see us go at it and see us compete and that's what I try to do and that's what I try to tell my teammates to do."

Bryant is gone now but

Beyonce and Jay-Z, Jack Nicholson and Justin Bieber are among the celebrities who attended that game and are scheduled to be back for at least some of this weekend.

Some things to watch as Los Angeles hosts the All-Star Game for a record sixth time:

**LEBRON IN L.A.:** James refuses to discuss his free agency during the season, but figure on it coming up in Los Angeles since there's been such speculation about him signing with the Lakers. The Lakers, after a trade with James' Cavaliers last week, would have enough salary cap space to offer a maximum contract to James and another star if he opts to become a free agent and leave Cleveland this summer.

**HOMEcoming KINGS:** The Los Angeles area is home to a number of All-Stars, including 2017 MVP Russell Westbrook of Oklahoma City and runner-up James Harden, along with Oklahoma City's Paul George and Toronto's DeMar DeRozan.

**SIDELINED STARS:** James' team will look much different than the one he drafted after a number of injuries. DeMarcus Cousins, Kevin Love, John Wall and Kristaps Porzingis all were forced to pull out. George, Andre Drummond,

Goran Dragic and Kemba Walker were added as injury replacements by Commissioner Adam Silver.

**DUNK LIKE DAD:** Larry Nance Jr., one of the players who went from Los Angeles to Cleveland in the four-player trade at the deadline, will be back in his former home arena to compete in the Slam Dunk Contest. He'll try to follow in the footsteps — or flight path — of his father, who won the NBA's first slam dunk title in 1984. Rookies Donovan Mitchell of Utah and Dennis Smith Jr., and Indiana All-Star Victor Oladipo round out the field.

**BIES IS BACK:** Bieber will return to play in the celebrity game on Friday night after winning MVP honors in the 2011 game. He will play on Team Lakers, co-coached by actor Michael B. Jordan. They will play against Team Clippers, who feature Academy Award winner Jaime Foxx.

**ALL-STAR SINGERS:** Fergie will sing the U.S. national anthem and Barenaked Ladies will perform the Canadian national anthem. Pharrell Williams and N.E.R.D will take the stage at halftime. Kendrick Lamar also is set to perform Friday night in Los Angeles as part of the weekend festivities.

# Welch, Holiday lead UCLA past Oregon State 75-68

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The first time UCLA played Oregon State this season left not just the memory of a double-overtime loss for the Bruins, but getting outrebounded and generally outmuscled.

UCLA coach Steve Alford made it clear prior to Thursday's rematch they would need a much different effort, and the Bruins delivered in a 75-68 victory over the Beavers.

With senior center Thomas Welch grabbing a career-high 17 rebounds to go with his 15 points, UCLA (18-8, 9-5 Pac 12), UCLA outrebounded Oregon State, 51-33.

"It felt like (Welch) could get any rebound he wanted," said UCLA guard Aaron Holiday, who had 17 points and 10 assists.

Alfred Hollins led Oregon State (13-12, 5-8) with 24 points. Stephen Thompson Jr. had 13 points. The Bruins held Beavers' leading scorer Tres Tinkle to 4-of-7 shooting and 11 points to snap Oregon State's two-game winning streak.

"We were just really in a fog on the defensive end and on the glass," said Beavers coach Wayne Tinkle. "Give them credit, they were the tougher team."

Nine of Welch's rebounds came on the offensive end.

"I just started going after every ball I could," Welch said. "That's really my focus every single night, to attack the glass."

UCLA remained tied for second in the conference with USC with the win, despite going just 4 of 21 on its 3-point attempts (19 percent) and 23 of 37 from the free-throw line (62 percent).

Free throws had also hurt the Bruins in their loss in Corvallis, where they shot even worse, hitting 19 of 35 free throws (54 percent).

The Beavers trailed by 13 in the first half, but rallied to briefly regain the lead early in the second half. They were down by four with under a minute left, but could not make the big plays down the stretch.

"We got selfish at the end, but not in a bad way," said Wayne Tinkle. "Maybe instead of trying to shoot over that 7-footer, maybe making that extra pass for a drop off would have been better."

**BIG PICTURE**

Oregon State: Will have to finish strong in its last five games to get above the .500 mark in conference play and decent seeding for the conference tournament.

UCLA: After looking strong in wins over Arizona and USC, the Bruins had stumbled in their previous game against Arizona State but regained their form against the Beavers.

**WELCH'S NEW LOOK**

The center suffered a bashed nose in the Bruins' loss last month to Oregon State, needed stitches and had been wearing a protective mask since.

Thursday he finally discarded it, and returning to his old look seemed to suit him.

"It's good to be done with it," Welch said.

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.22 caliber rifle and finishing in 41 minutes, 7.2 seconds.

The 22-year-old Swede entered the race ranked 42nd in the World Cup standings in the individual event and had never finished better than 25th in a 15-kilometer individual World Cup race.

"Of course I was surprised," said Oeberg, who broke into tears in the closing minutes of the race after realizing she would win gold. "I could not have imagined this before. I knew with this performance today could have taken me to a medal, but then to win this race it's just unbelievable."

Dahlmeier called Oeberg's performance a "surprise for everybody."

"With clean shooting and a

good skiing performance you can win this race," said Dahlmeier, who has connected on 48 of 50 shots in her three Olympic events. "Today only three athletes had no misses, so it's great for her. ... It must be one of the best days of her life."

Anastasiya Kuzmina finished second despite missing two shots, resulting in a two-minute penalty, and Dahlmeier took bronze.

"I have no idea how it is possible with two mistakes in individual," Kuzmina said of her second medal at the Olympics.

Kuzmina said she won the medal for her brother Anton Shipulin, a Russian biathlete who was banned from competing at the Pyeongchang Games.

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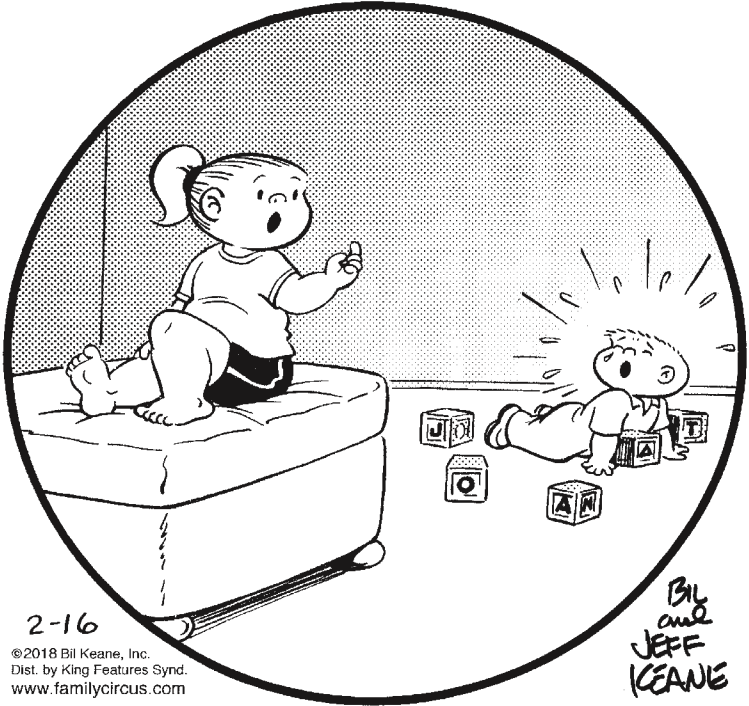

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


