Women's Cup changes hands again

The Women's FFAS National Cup has changed hands once again, with Ilaoa & To'omata wresting it away from the Tafuna Jets after a 1-0 win during their game on Match Day 3 of the 2017 FFAS National League.

Ilaoa & To'omata started the season as holders of the Cup before losing it to Taputimu Youth in the season's first challenge game for the hardware. A week later, Taputimu Youth coughed it up to the Tafuna Jets, who have now lost it to Ilaoa & To'omata for the second year running.

The Jets lost the Cup last year to Ilaoa & To'omata, and repeated that result last Saturday, Sept. 16, 2017 at Pago Park Soccer Stadium.

In other games, it was Taputimu Youth 0, Vaiala Tongan 0; Royal Puma 2, Pago Youth 0; Green Bay 1, PanSa 0 and Black Roses 1, Lion Heart 0.

ILAOA & TO'OMATA 1, TAFUNA JETS 0

It was a back and forth game between the two teams with neither one gaining an advantage over the other. Each team would have their opportunities to score with the Tafuna Jets maintaining possession during certain stretches of the game.

After that Ilaoa & To'omata would then take control of the game and enjoy possession inside Tafuna's side of the half. In the second half, a counterattack by the Leone-based team midway through the period led to the game's only goal.

Ama Faleao got on to a good pass inside the box and blasted it into the top of the far corner for the game's only score.

After that Tafuna turned up the heat but they could not score an equalizer.

Ilaoa & To'omata will face Vaiala Tongan in this week's Cup match while the Jets play against Black Roses.

TAPUTIMU YOUTH 0, VAIALA TONGAN 0

Vaiala Tongan dominated possession and shot attempts in this game, but could not quite score a

goal in what turned out to be their second tie out of three games of the season.

Taputimu Youth did not play great themselves, but did enough to stave off the wave of attacks coming at them, especially their goalie Grace Fanolua. She was steady in front of the net, calmly making saves on shots that came directly to her.

ROYAL PUMA 2, PAGO YOUTH 0

Royal Puma did all the scoring in the first half, with goals coming from Kristine Tuatoo and Vaileu Sua.

Both teams then played to a scoreless second half.

GREEN BAY 1, PANSA 0

Green Bay eked out a 1-0 win over PanSa thanks to a lone goal in the first half of their game.

BLACK ROSES 1, LION HEART 0

Deiondre Ott scored the game's only goal for Black Roses just two minutes before the halftime break, and they would take that lone score all the way to the end for the win.

Black Roses enjoyed possession of the ball but only managed one score in the game.

THREE TEAMS UNDEFEATED SO FAR IN MEN'S NATIONAL LEAGUE

Pago Youth, Lion Heart and Green Bay are all undefeated three weeks into the 2017 FFAS National League with similar records of 2-1-0.

Pago retained the men's FFAS National Cup in an 11-1 win over Vaiala Tongan B while Lion Heart beat Black Roses 5-0, and Green Bay edged Taputimu Youth 1-0. In other games, it was Utulei Youth 3, Ilaoa & To'omata 1; PanSa 2, Royal Puma 1 and Vaiala Tongan A 11, Tafuna Jets 1.

With all three teams tied with seven points each, Pago Youth leads by differential in goals with 15, Lion Heart with 10 and Green has three. Pago Youth and Green Bay played to a 2-2 draw on Sept. 9, and both teams have yet to play

Ohio State: Dismiss ex-player's lawsuit over image use

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — Ohio State wants a federal judge to dismiss a class-action lawsuit by one of its most famous football stars who alleges athletes' images were used without their permission and without compensation.

In a sign of how closely aligned that star, Chris Spielman, is with the university, however, Ohio State also is pledging to work with him to resolve the dispute.

At issue is an antitrust com-

plaint filed by Spielman in July that targeted Ohio State marketing programs and contracts that promote the university using likenesses of athletes. One example is a Honda-sponsored program of 64 banners hung around Ohio Stadium featuring photos of former players.

The lawsuit names Ohio State and talent management giant IMG as defendants and names Honda and Nike as co-conspirators. Nike is targeted for its "Legends of the Scarlet and Gray" vintage jersey licensing program and other apparel contracts with Ohio State.

The lawsuit accuses the university and the companies of "unjust and monopolistic behaviors" and asks for compensation above \$75,000, as is typical in such complaints. It notes that Ohio State makes millions of dollars from merchandising programs involving former athletes.

In a court filing Monday, the university said federal courts don't have jurisdiction over the complaint and Spielman hasn't met a legal burden required in such antitrust lawsuits.

Spielman "has not alleged that he sought and was denied a trademark license from Ohio State or that he was in any way precluded from exercising his own intellectual property rights by Ohio State's contracts," the university said.

Honda and Nike have declined to comment. A message was left Tuesday with an attorney representing IMG.

Spielman hasn't alleged any "market-wide anticompetitive effect" from the university's actions, another reason why his lawsuit should be dismissed, the university said.

Any remaining allegations should be heard by the Ohio Court of Claims, not the federal courts, the university said.

The university worked with Spielman and his attorneys to resolve the banner dispute after Spielman raised his concerns and the university determined the athletes pictured on them hadn't been contacted

in advance, Ohio State Athletic Director Gene Smith said Tuesday.

"Those discussions continued for several months," Smith said. "The filing of the lawsuit does not change our commitment to seeking a resolution of the banner issue."

Spielman's attorney, Brian Duncan, said he's disappointed the university is trying to have the suit thrown out "instead of trying to resolve the underlying claims." He said he and others are prepared to continue fighting for Spielman and the other former players.

Court rules required the university to respond to the lawsuit, and Ohio State believes Spielman made claims that were legally and factually unfounded, leading to the request to dismiss the complaint, said university spokesman Chris Davey.

Spielman is an NFL and college football analyst for Fox. He was an All-American linebacker at Ohio State, where he played from 1985 to 1987, and an All-Pro linebacker in the NFL who spent most of his career with the Detroit Lions.

A major breast cancer research center at Ohio State carries the name of his late wife, Stefanie Spielman, who died of cancer in 2009.

Spielman previously said he'd donate any money he receives from the lawsuit directly to the university's athletic department. He called the ability to negotiate corporate use of his name and image "a basic human right."

Spielman also has said attaching his name to Honda puts him in a difficult situation given a separate sponsorship deal he has with a local Mazda dealership.

In an unrelated development, an arrest warrant was issued Monday in Illinois for Spielman's son, Noah. The 21-year-old is one of five Wheaton College players charged with aggravated battery, mob action and unlawful restraint in an alleged hazing case involving another team member.

UCLA's ground game seeks a breakthrough against Stanford

LOS ANGELES (AP) — UCLA has struggled to run the ball and stop Stanford's rushing attack during its nine-game losing streak against the Cardinal.

The Bruins are hoping to reverse both trends on Saturday and get coach Jim Mora his first win in the rivalry.

"The coaches are saying that we need to basically leave it all on the field," right guard Michael Alves said. "I mean, of course that's the expectation for every game, but they said this is the specific game that we really need to really put forth all our effort."

Mora is 0-6 against Stanford. Since he took over, the Bruins have averaged 31.3 carries for 131.5 yards rushing per game against the Cardinal. But that total is buoyed by UCLA's 284 yards in the 2012 Pac-12 championship game.

Looking at just the regular season, UCLA is averaging 3.36 yards per attempt and totaling 101 yards per game. That includes a meager 77 yards on 33 carries last season, when Stanford scored two touchdowns in the final 24 seconds for a 22-13 comeback win.

"This is only my second year," Alves said. "I'm not too familiar with all of it, but I remember last year was a close game. I thought we were going to win."

Stanford has struggled to defend the run this season. It allowed 307 yards rushing in

a 42-24 loss to Southern California in the conference opener, and No. 22 San Diego State ran for 171 yards in a 20-17 win last week.

Alves said those totals reflect what the Trojans and Aztecs did right, not what Stanford did wrong.

"It's just the offenses are executing well," Alves said. "Every block they are making perfectly, so all we have to do is make our blocks and there should be holes there."

UCLA's new offense under first-year coordinator Jedd Fisch has come close to achieving similar success, but still has work to do. After abandoning the run to stage an unlikely 45-44 rally against Texas A&M, UCLA rushed for 132 yards against Hawaii and 170 yards in last week's loss at Memphis.

Fisch chooses not to evaluate his run game by the final yardage total. Instead, he wants UCLA to average at least 4.5 yards per carry. By that measure, the last two outings were successful, including a season-best 5.1 yards per attempt against the Tigers.

Still, there were too many breakdowns for new offensive line coach Hank Fraley's liking.

"I think that every time we run the ball we miss it by that much," Alves said. "When we have a negative play, we have a gain for less than 4 yards, I think we miss it by maybe one block, maybe half a block, so coach

Fraley has been stressing that we need to finish our blocks. We need to make sure we're doing everything he is teaching us. Then we won't have those little mistakes and we'll be able to open big holes."

Getting the run game in gear would also help UCLA avoid the massive time of possession disparity Stanford usually has been able to build, averaging 45.3 carries for 217 yards against Mora's defenses.

If UCLA's offense can turn the tables with the run, it would be a welcome change for the Bruins. But Fisch won't go with the run simply for the sake of being stubborn.

"I think the run game has progressed each week. I don't really look at it in terms of what we have to do, run or pass. I just look at it we have to move the football," Fisch said. "We have a good quarterback, so it's OK to pass it."

Cibulkova, Garcia move into Pan Pacific 2nd round

TOKYO (AP) — Fifth-seeded Dominika Cibulkova is targeting a strong finish to the season after dispatching Carla Suarez Navarro 6-3, 6-3 to book a second-round spot in the Pan Pacific Open on Tuesday.

Cibulkova has momentum after posting her best result of the season in August when reaching the final of the Connecticut Open.

She carried that to Tokyo, racing 5-1 ahead. Suarez Navarro broke in a seventh game that contained four deuces, and briefly threatened to fight her way back.

Last year's WTA Finals champion, Cibulkova broke in the third game of the second set, and again to love in the final game. It has rarely gone so well for Cibulkova this year. The weight of expectation following last year's four titles proved too much.

"Since the trip to the U.S., even though I lost in the third round in Cincinnati to Jo Konta,

I started to feel I was coming back," she said.

"Then in New Haven, even though I lost the final, I was really close to winning. Right now, I feel the best on court that I have all year.

"I was putting a lot of pressure on myself, that I have to repeat the same great year. Now I've lost this pressure. I want to enjoy the fact I've found my form and I feel fresh for this tournament and the others in Asia. I want to take this chance."

Cibulkova next plays Katerina Siniakova. The Czech defeated qualifier Jana Cepelova 1-6, 6-3, 6-4.

Polish qualifier Magda Linette surprised Cibulkova's Connecticut conqueror, Daria Gavrilova, 2-6, 6-0, 7-6 (3). Second-seeded Karolina Pliskova lies in wait on Wednesday.

Caroline Garcia — seeded following the withdrawal of virus-hit Agnieszka Radwanska — beat lucky loser Aliaksandra Sasnovich 6-4 6-3.



As coaches mull redshirts, some Pac-12 true frosh thrive

To redshirt or not to redshirt? That is the question for Pac-12 coaches who must weigh necessity and talent with maturity and readiness in deciding the immediate future of rookie players. It's certainly not an exact science.

"You never know how a kid is going to react the first time he's in a game," USC coach Clay Helton said. "He looks great at practice and then you get to the stadium. You can always tell with the freshmen — you go across in the huddle and you're like, 'Yep, that one's ready, that one's ready,' then the next one's got the deer-in-the-headlights look and you're like, 'Uh-oh, he may not be ready.'"

Sometimes, lack of depth or injuries make those decisions no-brainers. But there are a lot of other factors that go into the

process, as well.

Arizona (2-1) is playing 17 true freshmen this season, most in the league and third-most among FBS teams.

"At the first practice I meet with all of the freshmen and newcomers, and tell them not to assume they are redshirting. They are here to learn, but not to defer," coach Rich Rodriguez said. "I talked to them a couple of weeks into camp and some of them already know they want to play, and some may not. There are still true freshmen that have not played yet that still have a chance to play. We're playing a bunch of them, I saw we play the third-most true freshmen in the country. By the end of the year we will probably have the most because we still have many that will play."

Maturity is certainly an attribute of Colorado freshman

kicker James Stefanou, who at 30 is the second-oldest player at the FBS level. The Australian former soccer player is 10 for 10 on PATs and he's made six of seven field goals for the Buffaloes (3-0).

Seventh-ranked Washington has seven true freshmen who are making contributions: tight end Hunter Bryant, running back Salvon Ahmed and cornerback Elijah Molden.

The Huskies added receiver Ty Jones to the mix last week in a 48-16 victory over Fresno State. Asked what goes into his decision, Washington coach Chris Petersen replied: "Can they help us win now? That's about it."

"We think playing them is a good thing for those guys. Four or five years is such a long time — who knows what can happen in that time," he said.

College football players face felonies in attack on teammate

CHICAGO (AP) — Five members of a Christian college football team in suburban Chicago face felony charges after one of their teammates alleged they duct-taped his hands and feet and attempted to sodomize him with an object before dumping him half-naked in an off-campus park.

The DuPage County State's Attorney's office announced Monday that the five Wheaton College players are charged with aggravated battery, mob action and unlawful restraint.

A judge signed arrest warrants and set \$50,000 bonds for the players, who are expected to turn themselves in.

Authorities said Kyler Kregel, 21, a senior, of Grand Rapids, Michigan surrendered to police Tuesday evening. The other players are expected at the Wheaton Police Department sometime this week. State's attorney spokesman Paul Darrah said the most serious charge — aggravated battery — carries a maximum sentence of two to five years in prison.

Terry Ekl, an attorney representing the alleged victim, his client was attacked on March 19, 2016, while he was watching basketball on television from his dorm room on campus, about 30 miles west of Chicago. Ekl said the teammates tackled him, bound his hands behind his back with duct tape, put a pillowcase over his head and punched him when he yelled at them to stop.

Ekl said the student, a freshman at the time who is now 20 years old, alleges the five put him in the back seat of a car. With Middle Eastern music playing, he alleged, they made offensive comments about Muslims and told him that he was being kidnapped by Muslims who wanted to have sex with goats and that he would be their "goat" for the night.

He also said they "were dragging him behind by his arms," and pulled him so hard that he tore the cartilage called the labrum in both shoulders severely enough that he required at least two operations to repair the damage.

After the attack, the victim drove himself to a hospital where he was treated his injuries. Ekl said an emergency room nurse called police. He said his client left campus the next day and

returned home to Indiana, where he's attending college.

Wheaton College said it was notified about the alleged attack that same month and, working with an "independent" investigator, launched an investigation.

"The conduct we discovered as a result of our investigation into this incident was entirely unacceptable and inconsistent with the values we share as human beings. ..." according to a statement, which said the school has "engaged outside experts" to review the school's anti-hazing policy.

The school said "disciplinary measures" were taken but, declined to elaborate, citing "federal student privacy protections." Ekl said the players were required to perform community service and write an eight-page essay about the incident but were not suspended from the team.

Wheaton Police Chief Deputy Bill Murphy said there were a number of reasons why the investigation took more than a year. He said several interviews had to be conducted, and medical records had to be obtained. Also, he said that because the students all reside outside Illinois, the interviews that began before the end of the school year could not conclude until the students returned to class in the following fall.

The students being sought on arrest warrants are 22-year-old James Cooksey of Jacksonville, Florida; 21-year-old Benjamin Pettway of Lookout Mountain, Georgia; 21-year-old Noah Spielman of Columbus, Ohio; and 22-year-old Samuel TeBos of Allendale, Michigan.

All are listed on the team roster, and three of them played in the game that the No. 4-ranked Division III team played on Saturday, according to the Tribune. Spielman is the son of Chris Spielman, an All-American linebacker at Ohio State and All-Pro linebacker in the NFL who spent the bulk of his career with the Detroit Lions.

Wheaton announced late Tuesday all five have been suspended from the team. Spokeswoman LaTonya Taylor said the players have been deemed "inactive for practice or competition" by the college administration and the coaching staff.

Alex Gordon hits MLB's record-setting 5,694th HR of season

TORONTO (AP) — Kansas City's Alex Gordon hit Major League Baseball's record 5,694th home run of 2017 on Tuesday night, breaking a season record set in 2000 at the height of the Steroids Era.

Gordon's home run off Toronto's Ryan Tepera, which cut the Royals' deficit to 5-2, was his eighth this season and the 159th of his 11-year big league career.

It was the 17th of the night

and came just after Detroit's Alex Presley tied the record when he connected at home against Oakland's Daniel Gossett.

There were 5,610 homers last year, an average of 2.31 per game, and this year's average of 2.53 entering Tuesday's action projects to 6,139. That would be up 47 percent from 4,186 in 2014. Power subsided after the start of drug testing with penalties in 2004. The home run

average dropped in 2014 to its lowest level since 1992, then started rising during the second half of the 2015 season.

When the previous record of 5,693 was set in 2000, Sammy Sosa led the major leagues with 50 home runs and Barry Bonds hit 49.

Miami's Giancarlo Stanton leads the major leagues with 55 home runs this year, followed by New York Yankees rookie Aaron Judge with 44.

Stroman ends 5-start winless streak, Jays beat Royals 5-2

TORONTO (AP) — Marcus Stroman pitched seven innings to win for the first time in six starts, Darwin Barney hit a two-run homer and the Toronto Blue Jays beat the Kansas City Royals 5-2 on Tuesday night.

Kansas City outfielder Alex Gordon's solo home run off Ryan Tepera in the eighth was the 5,694th of this major league season, breaking the record set in 2000 at the height of the Steroids Era. The record was broken with just less than two weeks remaining in the regular season.

There were 5,610 homers last year, an average of 2.31 per game, and this year's average of 2.53 entering Tuesday projects to 6,139. That would be up 47 percent from 4,186 in 2014.

Barney went 2 for 3 with three RBIs as the Blue Jays opened their final homestand on a winning note.

Stroman (12-8) allowed one run and four hits for his first victory since Aug. 16 against Tampa Bay.

Tepera pitched the eighth and Roberto Osuna finished for his 37th save in 47 chances.

Barney reached second base on a one-out throwing error by third baseman Mike Moustakas in the third but appeared to forget how many outs there were and was doubled off on Teoscar Hernandez's liner to center.

That was the first of seven consecutive batters retired by Royals right-hander Ian Kennedy, a streak that ended when Ryan Goins singled to begin the sixth. Barney fell behind 2-0 against Kennedy, then fouled off three straight pitches

before homering into the left field bullpen.

Making his first start since Sept. 8 after missing a turn because of a sore shoulder, Kennedy (4-12) allowed two runs and three hits in five-plus innings. He walked none and struck out two.

Winless in nine starts, Kennedy is 0-6 with an 8.29 ERA since his last victory, July 26 at Detroit.

Toronto pulled away with a three-run seventh. Russell Martin hit a two-run double off Scott Alexander and Barney greeted Brandon Maurer with an RBI single.

Jose Bautista struck out twice, giving him 159 for the year and matching Jose Canseco (1998) and Kelly Johnson (2012) for the highest season total in Blue Jays history.

TRAINER'S ROOM

Royals: C Salvador Perez (pulled side muscle) and OF Lorenzo Cain (rest) returned to the lineup after sitting out Sunday's loss at Cleveland. Moustakas (right knee), who was limited to pinch-hitting duties Sunday, also started for Kansas City.

UP NEXT

Royals: RHP Jakob Junis (7-2, 4.15) is 4-0 with a 2.35 ERA over his past seven starts. Junis has won five straight decisions and is unbeaten since June 29 at Detroit.

Blue Jays: LHP Brett Anderson (3-3, 5.73) was bothered by a blister during his previous outing, Sept. 14 at Minnesota, but was able to throw a bullpen session Sunday.



Oklahoma State's receiver group more than just Washington

STILLWATER, Okla. (AP) — James Washington came into the season as the standout receiver for No. 6 Oklahoma State. Now he has a lot of company among the Cowboys' talented group of wide receivers.

Four OSU wideouts, including Washington, recorded at least 100 yards receiving in Oklahoma State's 59-21 victory over Pittsburgh, as Heisman Trophy candidate Mason Rudolph threw for 497 yards and five touchdowns, all in the first half.

That was the first time in school history more than two receivers reached 100 yards in the same game and the first time any team had four since Texas Tech in 2005.

"Going into the year, we felt good about the group we have, and they're competitive," Oklahoma State coach Mike Gundy said. "We've got young guys who are making plays. They're unselfish. The depth allows us to save legs and keep them fresh throughout the game. Mason's done a good job, with the exception of the one interception he threw, in distributing the ball, based on what the defense gives us."

The Cowboys play their Big 12 opener Saturday against No. 16 TCU.

While Washington had five receptions for 124 yards against Pitt, he didn't make his first catch until late in the second quarter, when Oklahoma State was already ahead 35-0. Pitt clearly made a tactical decision to eliminate Washington, one of the favorites for the Biletnikoff Award as the nation's top receiver, as a threat, so Rudolph simply found other open receivers.

Junior Jalen McCleskey had seven receptions for 162 yards

and three touchdowns, while freshman Dillon Stoner had five catches for 100 yards and a touchdown and senior Marcell Ateman pulled down four catches for 109 yards and a TD.

"They're unselfish, that's really the biggest characteristic that helps you because they understand work ethic, they care for one another, they like to see each other succeed," OSU offensive coordinator Mike Yurcich said. "That's really important. It makes it fun to coach, because you're not stressed. It doesn't matter. Whoever's open gets it, whatever coverage they're going to roll to, you go the other way. You can't predict it and you just go through the progressions and let the quarterback do what he does, and it makes it easier for everybody."

McCleskey attributed his breakout performance, in which he achieved career-highs in yards and touchdowns, to Rudolph simply going to the open man. After recording a team-leading 73 receptions last year for 812 yards (second to Washington's 1,380) and seven touchdowns (second to Washington's 10), McCleskey had just five catches for 17 yards in Oklahoma State's first two games.

"Whenever they take something away, the other (receivers) have to step up and make plays, and that's what we did," McCleskey said. "Whatever they give us, we're going to take it. So the first two games, James and (Ateman), they had big games, and this game was just mine."

Stoner, lining up mostly as a slot receiver, also set personal bests in receptions and yards, and recorded his first career receiving touchdown (he did

throw one last year before he was redshirted). He entered the day with six catches for 42 yards.

Ateman, who missed all of last season with a foot injury, continued his stellar season. Through three games he is tied with Washington for the team lead with 13 receptions and is second with 235 yards.

"They know one day they might get eight touches and the next day it might be only three," Yurcich said of the group. "And they understand who's getting double-covered and who's open, and we can only snap one ball on each play. They get it and they're a very talented group."



Dolphins suspend Timmons and acquire Anthony as replacement

MIAMI (AP) — AWOL linebacker Lawrence Timmons wanted to rejoin the Miami Dolphins. Instead, they suspended him indefinitely and traded for a replacement, moves that signal his disappearance from the Dolphins' defense may be permanent.

The Dolphins announced Timmons' suspension in a one-sentence news release Tuesday, a day off for the team.

They also acquired linebacker Stephone Anthony from the New Orleans Saints for a fifth-round draft pick in 2018. Anthony, who has been nursing a sprained ankle, fell out of favor with the Saints after they took him with the 31st overall pick in the 2015 draft.

Timmons' agent, Drew Rosenhaus, declined to comment on the suspension. Coach Adam Gase was angered by the disappearance of the 11th-year veteran, which occurred Saturday in Los Angeles the day before Miami's season opener at the Chargers. The Dolphins filed a missing person report before making contact with Timmons, who apparently was dealing with a personal matter. He wasn't with the Dolphins at the game and didn't fly back to South Florida on the team plane after Miami's 19-17 win.

Anthony started all 16 games for the Saints as a rookie, but was mostly a reserve last season for New Orleans' woeful defense.
