The 7th week of the regular season for the American Samoa High School Athletics Association's 2017-18 football season, last weekend, featured the mighty Lions taking on the Big Red Machine, the Faga'itua Vikings, who made a stunning comeback and won 32-26, their second victory over the Lions this season.

Coverage of ASHSAA high school football is sponsored by Congresswoman Aumua Amata.

While they lost in the varsity division, Leone didn't go home empty handed, as their JV unit led by Oakland Salave'a and Cyan Fiatoa, led the Lions to their first victory of the season, defeating the Vikings 26-14 in the final quarter of play.

The talk of the town that day was Vikings quarterback, Vito Kitona, who sat out during the whole first half of the game, came in during the second half, and carried the Vikings to victory — literally pulling them out of the grave in a 32- 26 comeback win.

VARSITY DIVISION
FAGA'ITUA 32 - LEONE 26

The Lions were disappointed in themselves after watching a huge lead go to waste — all in the second half of play — when Vikings starting quarterback Vito Kitona, finally took to the field after sitting out the entire first half due to disciplinary issues. He was benched by Head coach Sua'ese Pooch

Ta'ase.

With Kitona out during the opening half, Ta'ase and the Vikings opted to go with Advent Migi at quarterback, as they tried to run down the Lions defense with their option game. At the same time, the Lions defensive unit led by Api So'oalo and Ali'itoa Langkilde were able to plug up the open windows in the Vikings running game.

The Lions offensive unit led by Iverson Ta'ase spotted a threatening third down situation from their own 30-yard line.

Ta'ase found Antwan Legget on the post route to the end zone for the opening touchdown of the game — a long passing reception for the Lions put them in the lead with six points.

Suddenly, the Vikings were on fire with their option game. Passes out to Jeffery Fulu left the running game open for the Vikings, as Pitonu'u Ah Sue and Migi led the Vikings into Lion territory — playing a threatening second and goal situation from Leone's 5-yard line where Migi tucked and ran the ball in for six, bringing the Vikes to tie up the ball game at six a piece.

Midway through the first half of play — 5:56 remaining in the second quarter and the Lions Ta'ase crosses the goal line with Leone's second touchdown of the game: a 10-yard inside hand off to Ta'ase that put Leone in the lead with six points. The two point conversion was a quick fade pass out

**World Series patches
in place, Dodgers
prepare for Astros**

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The Los Angeles Dodgers love their analytics, collecting so much data that manager Dave Roberts proudly proclaims: “I don’t see any team that’s more prepared than we are.”

All the numbers, video and advanced scouting reports are great. But firsthand looks are nice, too.

So Curtis Granderson, what do you know about your World Series opponent, the Houston Astros?

“I saw them a couple times in spring training, when I was with the Mets,” the outfielder said.OK, then.

Funny, in a way. The Astros and Dodgers have played more than 700 times over the years, but these clubs know very little about each other.

“A lot of it is going to be

learning as you go,” Granderson said.

Los Angeles ace Clayton Kershaw is set to pitch Game 1 on Tuesday night against Dallas Keuchel at Dodger Stadium. Rich Hill will start Game 2 for the Dodgers vs. AL Championship Series MVP Justin Verlander.Yu Darvish will start Game 3 for the Dodgers when the Series shifts to Houston on Friday night. Acquired from Texas on July 31, he’s the most familiar with the Astros.

Darvish is 5-5 in 14 career starts against them, including 1-1 this season.

Keuchel has never faced the Dodgers. Verlander beat Los Angeles on Aug. 20 with eight dominant innings, shortly before he got traded from Detroit.“It’s hard to dismiss the two guys at the top of the rotation,” Roberts said, also praising Houston’s “athleticism” and “ability to slug.”

The Astros showed off all facets Saturday night, beating the New York Yankees 4-0 in Game 7 of the ALCS.

The Dodgers haven’t played the Astros since 2015, when they dropped a three-game series at Houston. The previous time they met was 2012, back when Houston was still in the National League and stuck in the midst of three straight 100-loss seasons.

Boosted by Jose Altuve and Carlos Correa, the Astros are now among the elite teams in the majors.

Hill also knows how quickly things can turn around. Wearing a hat that had a World Series emblem on the side, the 37-year-old reflected on where he was fairly recently.

In 2015, beset by injuries, no team in the big leagues wanted him and he wound up pitching for the Long Island Ducks.

“A couple years ago, I was using a bucket in independent ball as a toilet,” he said.

Not anymore.

Hill became a valuable member of the Dodgers’ staff, signed a rich contract and has helped them make it back to the World Series for the first time since 1988.

Like Hill, All-Star short-stop Corey Seager is expected to make his first World Series appearance. Seager got there a bit faster — at 23, a season after he was the NL Rookie of the Year.

Seager didn’t play in the NL Championship Series against the Cubs because of a back injury. But Roberts said team was “very confident” Seager was ready to return.

Seager hit .295 with 22 home runs and 77 RBIs this year. He went 3 for 11 with four walks in the NL Division Series against Arizona, but tweaked his back during a slide in Game 3.

Broncos have plenty to fix after first shutout in 25 years

CARSON, Calif. (AP) — In a locker room still processing the franchise’s first shutout since Nov. 22, 1992, the Denver Broncos knew there was plenty of blame to go around after a 21-0 loss at the Los Angeles Chargers on Sunday.

The defense took the blame for not creating turnovers. The special teams took the blame for allowing a punt return touchdown that allowed the Chargers to play with the lead. And the offense, well, where to begin?

“Everybody had faults this game,” linebacker Shaquil Barrett said. The Broncos rushed for 69 yards and allowed five sacks. Quarterback Trevor Siemian couldn’t move the ball down the field. When he did, tight end A.J. Derby fumbled after making a catch. Demaryius Thomas had an 81-yard play negated because of an offensive pass interference penalty.

“The past two weeks is not us,” Thomas said.

For the offense, this was the culmination of issues that had been brewing for weeks. Denver had scored one touchdown in each of its previous three games before finally getting held scoreless for the first time since facing the then-Los Angeles Raiders 25 years ago.

Injuries have been a factor, notably on the offensive line and at wide receiver. Rookie left tackle Garrett Bolles looked overmatched against the devastating edge-rushing tandem of Joey Bosa and Melvin Ingram. Guard Andre Barbre started at right tackle. There were dropped passes, missed assignments and missed plays in the running game.

“We’re not blocking well. We’re not protecting well. We had some good plays called again today, we had some guys wide open. We’re just not hitting the passes,” Broncos head coach Vance Joseph said.

Joseph said he never considered benching Siemian, who was 25 of 35 for 207 yards, no touchdowns and one interception.

“He’s our quarterback,” Joseph said. “It’s a two-score game for most of the game, so why make a change when we’re still in the game? It wasn’t simply on Trevor. I felt up until five minutes to go it was a game we could have won.”

Thomas was even more forceful in his defense of Siemian. “I got Trevor’s back, I don’t care what nobody say,” said Thomas, who had two receptions for nine yards. “It’s about what we got to do as a group, as an offense to make us better. Once we do that, then you’ll see people start pointing fingers at something else.”

Taking pressure off the offense was a common refrain, either by giving them fewer third-and-longs or getting better field position. The Broncos were 3 of 14 on third down, 1 for 7 when needing at least seven yards. Four drives started inside their own 10-yard line.

The defense wants to rectify the latter problem by generating takeaways, something they did not do against the Chargers. The Broncos have one interception and no fumble recoveries in their last four games.

“There are so many different ways to get turnovers, and we’re not getting any of them. We got to create a short field for our offense,” linebacker Von Miller said.

In spite of the myriad problems, resulting in a performance as that several players described as “embarrassing,” Miller was confident the Broncos can still recover.

“You can’t lose two games straight and not have any issues, so we obviously got issues that we need to address from the top down,” Miller said.

to Legget had the Lions up 14-6 heading into halftime.

Opening up the second half of play was Leone’s Langkilde, who caught the long pass from Feagia’i for the opening touchdown of the second half.

8:12 into the third quarter, and the Lions extended their lead by two possessions.

Vito Kitiona was now on full display in the second half, making up for his absence during the first half.

He led the Vikings back into Lions territory and — with the tuck and run — and put the Vikings on the board for the second time.

Kitiona ran in a 10-yard quarterback keeper for his first touchdown of the game. The two-point conversion, a pass out to Aroni Taua’a was good and brought them to within 6.

Next play sent the kick over to the Lions for their second offensive possession of the second half, Feagia’i turned to fire a long one out to Legget for Leone’s fourth touchdown of the game: a 76-yard touchdown reception by Legget that extended Leone’s lead to 26-14. The two-point conversion pass out to Ben Tikeri was swatted by Georgia Mageo.

The kick off to the Vikings was returned by Aroni Taua’a for 60 yards, bringing the Vikings past midfield and into Lions territory for another offensive drive – Kitiona leading the Vikings into Leone’s red zone, managing to tuck and run it in again on a quarterback keep for six, as Kitiona brought the Vikings back to life, to trail the Lions by one possession.

The two-point conversion, a counter trey with Kitiona again on the tuck and run, brought the Vikings back to trail the Lions by four points.

1:22 remaining in the third quarter of play, and the Vikings were back on their rhythmic No-Huddle offense with Kitiona at quarterback.

Vikings second and long situation on Leone’s 15 yard line, and Kitiona with his third tuck and run play scored his third touchdown of the game - all in the third quarter of play — bringing the Vikings to lead for the first time in the game, 30-26.

7:16 remaining in the ball game, and the Lions were continuously shooting themselves in the foot with penalties, giving another opportunity to the Vikings for another threatening drive inside Leone territory.

Kitiona, leading the Vikings from Leone’s 13-yard line, sent Migi up the middle with a counter hand off for Migi’s second touchdown of the game — extending their lead 36-26.

The two-point conversion by TJ Aulava was enough to put this one away for good,

as the Vikings came back to win 38-26.

JUNIOR VARSITY LEONE 26 - FAGA’ITUA 14

Head Coach Oakland Salave’a and his Lions didn’t hesitate to go to the air for the opening play of the game, with a daring play call to try and spread Faga’itua’s defense, while exploring their options in the running game with Ron Fuala’au and Oakie Salave’a at quarterback.

During their first offensive drive, Salave’a led his offensive unit all the way into Vikings territory with a dangerous option game that had the Vikes guessing into their own red zone.

1:23 in the opening quarter, and Salave’a sends Ron Fuala’au straight up the middle for the opening touchdown of the game.

The two-point conversion quarterback keeper by Salave’a put the Lions up early by eight.

Opening up the second quarter of play was Salave’a again, on the a play action pass, rolling out of the pocket to put the ball in the numbers of Fuala’au for his second touchdown of the game, with 8:52 remaining in the first half.

3:16 remaining in the second quarter, and the Vikings spotted a threatening third and goal situation inside the Lions red zone, where Angel Iosua plowed his way up the middle of Leone’s defense and scored the Vikings first touchdown of the game. Jacob Umu with the two-point conversion brought the Vikings back to trail the Lions 8-14.

Midway into the second half of play – 6:17 in the third quarter, and Salave’a played out a second and long situation on the Lions 15-yard line. A play action pass from Salave’a to Josiah Ta’ani confirmed another Lions touchdown after Ta’ani came down with the ball inside the end zone for six.

The two-point conversion to Fuala’au was clogged up in the backfield by Umu of the Vikings – his third time stopping Fuala’au in the backfield with solo tackles.

3:30 remaining in the final quarter of play, and the Vikings desperate offensive possession to get out to midfield, turned sour on them when a shot gun snap by the Vikings center went over past the kicker and into the end zone – and recovered by Leone’s defensive unit, led by Cyan Fiatoa and (#58) for a defensive touchdown, adding six more points to the scoreboard for Leone and extending their lead 26-8.

With just 30 seconds remaining in the ball game, Umu caught a 15-yard pass for another Faga’itua touchdown, which wasn’t enough as the Lions won 26-14.

Wiggins' heave banks in, leads Timberwolves past Thunder

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — Andrew Wiggins didn't have time to get near the basket for a final shot. Just inside halfcourt was close enough. Wiggins' desperation heave banked in as time expired to give the Minnesota Timberwolves a 115-113 victory over the Oklahoma City Thunder on Sunday night.

"I could see how much time was left," Wiggins said. "I got as close as I could and let it go."

Carmelo Anthony had hit a 3-pointer with about five seconds left to give the Thunder the lead. The Timberwolves were out of timeouts, so they had to scramble. Taj Gibson inbounded to Wiggins, who rushed up the court and got free with help from a crushing pick by Karl-Anthony Towns before pulling up for the winner.

"Everything worked perfectly," Wiggins said. "Taj found me. KAT had a great screen. When it left my hands, the release felt amazing."

Gibson said the Timberwolves practice those kinds of plays regularly. "We practice it six times in practice every day," Gibson said. "Once I got the ball, my job is to take the ball out, be patient, look for the open man, look for the guy running the baseline. I was trying to get Jeff (Teague), but Wig was wide open. KAT did what he was supposed to do, backscreen, and the rest is history."

Thunder forward Paul George got knocked down on Towns' screen, and it freed up Wiggins. "I did see Paul go down, but I didn't have a great look to see how he went down and why," Thunder coach Billy Donovan said.

Hostile home crowd can't slow Bolts in 21-0 win over Broncos

CARSON, Calif. (AP) — When the Chargers decided to return to Los Angeles this season after 56 years in San Diego, they suspected they might face a hostile crowd in every game they played. Halfway through their first season, their home gatherings at StubHub Center have all featured huge cheering sections for their opponents.

Although the Denver Broncos had at least as much support as the Chargers on a sweltering Sunday, those orange-clad fans were crushed on a historic day for both franchises. For the first time since Dec. 18, 1960, the Los Angeles Chargers won a home game.

And they did it by sending their AFC West rivals to their first shutout loss in nearly a quarter-century. Travis Benjamin returned a first-quarter punt 65 yards for a touchdown and caught a 42-yard TD pass in the fourth, and the Chargers played a dominant defensive game in the first home victory of their relocation season, 21-0 over the Broncos on Sunday.

Bosa and Chris McCain each had two of the Chargers' five sacks while Los Angeles' defense forced three turnovers and flattened Trevor Siemian and the Broncos (3-3), who

hadn't been blanked since a 24-0 loss to the Los Angeles Raiders on Nov. 22, 1992. Denver had scored in 394 straight games, the longest active streak in the NFL and the second-longest in league history.

The Chargers (3-4) are hoping there's nothing like making a little history to get the home fans on your side.

Los Angeles won three straight under new coach Anthony Lynn following a winless opening month in front of stadiums filled predominantly with unfriendly fans. The players have turned the less-than-ideal situation in the StubHub stands into a challenge to win over locals with prior rooting interests.

"We just said, 'Let's not even let that be an issue,'" said Philip Rivers, who passed for 183 yards in his 100th victory. "I don't think it was in any way a reason why we lost those (first) three (home) games, but it certainly took a little getting used to. ... It's just going to take some time working here until we're in a stadium that is dominated by Charger blue."

Cornerback Casey Hayward recalled what defensive coordinator Gus Bradley told the Chargers on Saturday.




