For everyone who's been praying for a post-season — your prayers have been answered, thanks to principal Tupa'i Rod Atafua, head coach Pati Pati and the mighty Samoana Sharks who sent the Warriors packing in both divisional match-ups during the 8th week of the 2017-18 American Samoa High School Athletics Association (ASHSAA) football season.

Coverage of this year's ASHSAA football is sponsored by Congresswoman Aumua Amata.

The Blue Empire came out of a bye week, and delivered Tafuna their first loss of the season in the varsity division — through a desperate drive in the final seconds of the match, which resulted in a game winning field goal by Elliot Lelei, who had missed all his field goal attempts this year, except this one: a game winner.

In the junior varsity division, the Sharks edged the Warriors in a two-point victory, 8-6, their second win over the Warriors in regular season, making Samoana the No.1 seed in the division.

The Warriors' injuries from their previous match ups took a toll on them, as the team wasn't able to field two of their star players, Panapa Filoiali'i and Fetu Gaoa — forcing them to move Koison Ozu up from the JV squad, to be the Warriors workhorse last Saturday against the Sharks, pairing up with Ben Tuimaseve who also took snaps as running back throughout the whole game for the first time

this season.

**VARSITY DIVISION
SAMOANA 15, TAFUNA 14**

The Sharks defensive unit led by their strong front, Sonny Nakiso, Antonio Pule, Solomon Seiuli, and Sebastian Briski managed to shut down the Warriors in the opening quarter of the match, as Tala Sufia couldn't seem to figure out a way past the Blue Empire's defensive wall.

Sufia, who hadn't thrown an interception all season, threw two last Saturday against the Sharks, and both were picked off by the 'Black Panther' Kalisi Lotulelei.

1:14 remaining in the opening quarter of the game, and Samoana spots a threatening first and goal situation on Tafuna's 1-yard line. This came after a long pass caught by Zephanaia Pati inside the red zone.

Samoana's third and goal situation and Anthony Feala muscled in their first touchdown of the game with a quarterback sneak, putting them in the lead. The field goal attempt by Elliot Lelei was no good, as his kick went far right of the goal posts.

Just when the Sharks thought they lit the flame of hope in the opening quarter, Tafuna's Sufia watered out those hopes after he bombed a long pass out to Pene Fa'avae who caught it inside Samoana territory. On first down, Sufia sent Ben Tuimaseve straight up the middle for a 15-yard touchdown run for Tafuna.

The two point conversion - a quarterback keeper by Sufia - was good enough to bring the Warriors back to life, leading by

Elliott, Cowboys await another hearing on 6-game suspension

LANDOVER, Md. (AP) — Ezekiel Elliott and the Dallas Cowboys should soon find out if the running back will be eligible to play the rest of the season.

Elliott has another hearing Monday to decide whether he'll serve a six-game suspension as a result of a yearlong NFL investigation that found he had multiple physical confrontations in 2016 with his girlfriend at the time.

"We need him, but what is important is that he gets a fair shake," owner Jerry Jones said Sunday after Elliott ran for 150 yards and two touchdowns in a 33-19 victory over the Washington Redskins. "Zeke has in no way, by any standard, done anything wrong. He's done nothing wrong. We, the league, have tried to say that he's done something that we disagree with. We all don't agree with that. So I want him to get a fair shot. And he deserves that."

NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell suspended Elliott in August for six games, a ban that has been fought over in court since. Prosecutors in Ohio declined to pursue a criminal case, citing conflicting evidence.

"We've got a pretty good system in place in this country," Jones said. "It's called the legal system, and it has a lot of precedent and it's made a lot of mistakes, but it's the best one there probably is in the world in my view and for us to not basically recognize that, that's a concern."

With the 5-2 Kansas City Chiefs up next, the Cowboys hope they'll have Elliott, who has run for 100-plus yards in three consecutive games and has four rushing touchdowns over the past two weeks. Elliott believes he'll keep playing.

"I think we're confident in our argument," said Elliott, who will attend the hearing. "We're confident I'll be on the field for the rest of the year."

Elliott has 690 yards rushing

and six touchdowns and 210 yards receiving with two scores this season. Although the 22-year-old voiced confidence in fellow running backs Alfred Morris, Darren McFadden and Rod Smith, Dallas doesn't have someone else who can do what Elliott does at his level.

Because of that, the Cowboys are eager for some clarity that is expected to come out of Elliott's hearing Monday.

"We'll deal with it and go on, but, yeah, it'll be beneficial, I guess, to say we'll know if we have him or not," quarterback Dak Prescott said. "Hopefully we can get it all out the way. But it's out of my control and out of his control for the most part. It's up to the people that make those decisions, and we're going to take it as a team and I know he will the right way and move forward."

Some more things we learned from the Cowboys' victory at the Redskins:

REDSKINS' INJURIES

The Redskins have so many injuries along their offensive line that they were forced to use one player Sunday, Arie Kouandjio, who "just got out of his car yesterday" at the team facility, as coach Jay Gruden put it. Starters Trent Williams, Brandon Scherff and Spencer Long sat out against Dallas. A fourth starter, Shawn Lauvao, got a stinger and left the loss. The backup to Williams' backup also left the game. Two of the team's three active tight ends, Niles Paul (concussion) and Jordan Reed (right hamstring), departed, too. Getting some bodies back could make a big difference moving forward for Washington. "Never seen something like this before. Never, ever in my life," cornerback Josh Norman said. "This was the first time for me, to see these types of injuries. Shoot, how many of our offensive linemen? Four? Five? ... It's crazy. Can't really say enough about how crazy it is."

Eagles' Jenkins: NFL owners declined meeting with players

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Philadelphia Eagles safety Malcolm Jenkins, one of the founders of The Players Coalition, said the next proposed meeting between the owners and players to discuss social justice initiatives has been canceled.

"The league didn't accept our invitation," Jenkins said Sunday. NFL players proposed to meet Monday in Philadelphia. Jenkins said the league cited scheduling and logistical issues.

"At this point, the ball is in their court," Jenkins said. "We'll continue to do what we've been doing. Guys are working around the league."

League spokesman Brian McCarthy said Sunday night: "Nothing is set, but the league is eager to continue the dialogue with the players."

The league and players met last week in New York to discuss player demonstrations during the national anthem and other issues.

"They want to get back to football; we want to move past anthem demonstrations," Jenkins said. "But to do that, we need to be able to replace the platform that we have."

Jenkins wants a venue outside the stadium and not during the anthem for athletes to raise awareness of social issues.

"We don't really enjoy doing this," Jenkins said. "We'd love to have a different platform and we think that's something we could work collaboratively with the NFL to create, to actually draw awareness to the issues we're doing, to use the NFL as a vehicle to make real change."

Colin Kaepernick, who began kneeling during the national anthem before the 2016 season and currently is out of the NFL, did not attend the

meeting last week.

Jenkins declined to address a report Sunday on Slate.com that said Kaepernick had been iced out of discussions between owners and players. Jenkins and other players had said Kaepernick was invited.

McCarthy also made it clear the NFL would like to include Kaepernick.

"We would welcome Colin at a meeting, but it's the players who are extending the invitations," he said.

Kaepernick has filed a grievance against the NFL, alleging that he was not signed because of collusion by owners who wanted him out of the league because of the protests.

Jenkins said the players want Kaepernick "to be a part of the conversation."

San Francisco safety Eric Reid, who took a knee during the national anthem again Sunday, said Kaepernick told him he would attend if invited.

"I know Colin has been fighting to get in the room to speak to the appropriate people in the NFL," Reid said. "He told me that he was explicitly told he had no place being there. The NFL wants the protests to end. It's bad for their business. But it's ridiculous that they don't want Colin to be there being that he was the first one to start protesting. If we have to force him into the room, that's what we'll do."

Chargers linebacker Russell Okung, who has been raising his fist during the national anthem, said the league has "amazing political and economic power" and hoped it would walk with the players "to will that power in a way that changes the dynamic of our country."

Jenkins and Eagles' teammate Rodney McLeod raised their fists during the national

anthem Sunday. Kneeling across the field on the San Francisco 49ers sideline were Reid, Eli Harold, Adrian Colbert and Marquise Goodwin.

All but 10 members of the Houston Texans took a knee during the national anthem Sunday, as the vast majority of the team protested the owner's "inmates running the prison" comment. Before this week, no Texans had protested during the anthem.

"It's already a sensitive issue," Jenkins said. "What am I proud of is, I feel like the voice of the players has been pretty concise and consistent. Even when you've had responses the president, responses from different owners that have not been in the good spirit of solidarity. The players have remained pretty level-headed. We're more concerned about getting actual work done and change and going about the right steps to do that."

Jenkins said he did not know when players and owners might meet again.

"I feel like we've done everything that we needed to do to really try to work in a collaborative effort with the league," Jenkins said. "We've showed up at meetings that they've requested. We've had the conversations they wanted to between us."

Jenkins was among a group of Eagles that made a trip last week to the state capitol in Harrisburg and met with legislators to discuss criminal justice reform.

Florida, McElwain agree to part ways after 3rd straight loss

GAINESVILLE, Fla. (AP) — The paperwork for Jim McElwain’s departure hadn’t even been completed when Florida athletic director Scott Stricklin announced a motto for his coaching search: He wants the Gators to be fun again.

That surely starts with an improved offense. The school and McElwain agreed to part ways Sunday, a day after a third consecutive loss and nearly a week after McElwain said his players and their families had received death threats.

Stricklin named defensive coordinator Randy Shannon the team’s interim coach for the final four games. Stricklin said the sides reached an agreement in principle to settle McElwain’s \$12.5 million buyout, but he declined to reveal details until the deal is signed.

“This is more than just wins

and losses,” Stricklin said. “I’ll just leave it at that.”

Florida (3-4, 3-3 Southeastern Conference), which is still paying former coach Will Muschamp, hoped to significantly reduce McElwain’s sum and likely used his actions over the last week as leverage.

Regardless, McElwain’s tenure will be remembered for failing to fix a floundering offense. Three years ago, McElwain proclaimed he could win with his dog at quarterback. The Gators currently rank 113th in total offense, in triple digits nationally for the third time in McElwain’s three seasons.

“When Florida has been really good, from a distance, it has looked really fun and I want it to be really fun,” Stricklin said. “Our fans, they deserve it to be really fun. I want our players and student-athletes to have a lot of fun, like this is a rewarding experience to come here and get a degree from a top-10 public university and to play at one of the storied football programs in the country.”

McElwain went 22-12 with the Gators, including 4-9 against ranked teams, and became the first coach in league history to take a team to the SEC championship game in his first two years. Florida was eliminated from contention in the Eastern Division with a 42-7 loss to rival Georgia on Saturday. It was Florida’s most lopsided loss in the series since 1982.

McElwain’s downfall was more about relationships than records. His already-strained rapport with administrators reached a new low last Monday when he mentioned the death threats. The bombshell shocked Stricklin, who had not been notified about a potentially harmful situation. Stricklin met with McElwain later that day, and the coach rebuffed a request to provide more information about the threats. The school’s position was this: If there were death threats and administrators did nothing about them, the Gators would be legally liable if something horrible happened. If McElwain exaggerated the threats or made them up altogether, then he essentially sullied an entire fan base without merit. McElwain made the situation even worse two days later when he said he would provide more details about the death threats “when it becomes unmanageable.”

McElwain seemed resigned to his fate Saturday night, probably because his problems started long before last week.

The former Alabama assistant and Colorado State head coach complained publicly about Florida’s facilities shortly after taking the job and openly questioned the school’s commitment to the football program two years later.



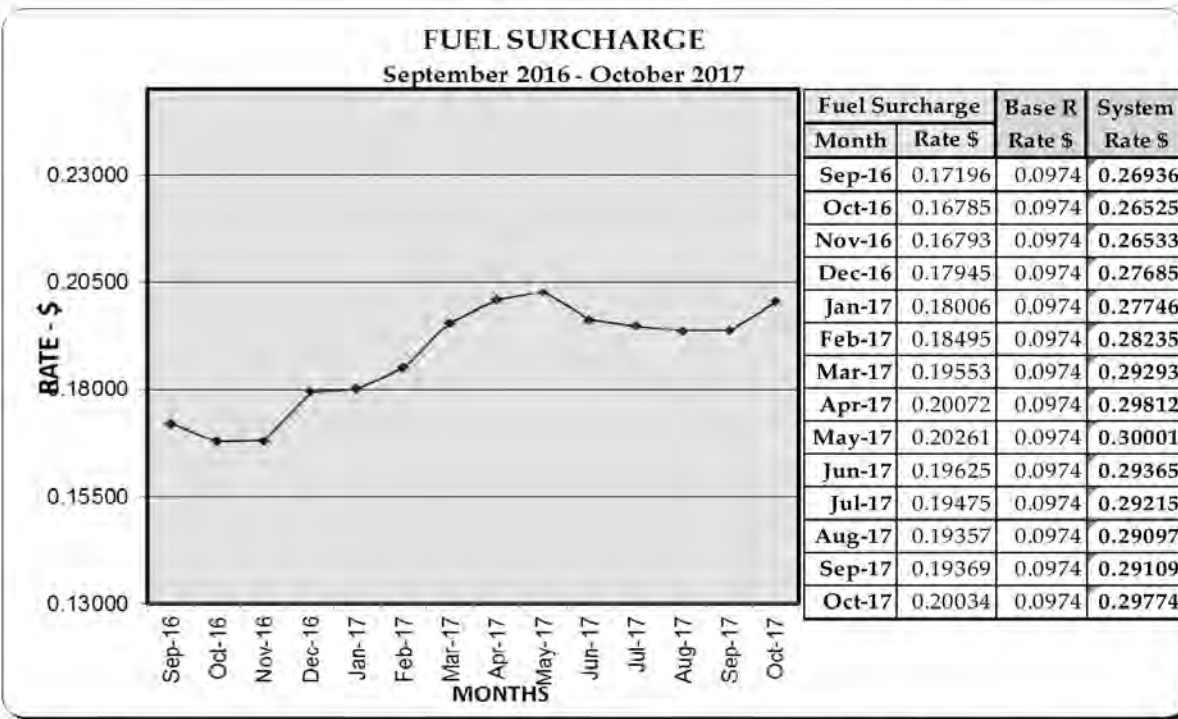

Monthly Fuel Surcharge Notification

The American Samoa Power Authority is informing its customers about the monthly fuel surcharge rate, which is the direct cost of fuel to generate electricity. The charge for each kilowatt hour (kWh) comprises the “base rate” and the “fuel surcharge rate.”

The base rate, which remains the same monthly for all electric customer classes, pays for ASPA’s operating costs and for infrastructure upgrades needed to get power to your home and business.



The fuel surcharge rate changes monthly due to fluctuating fuel costs. The fuel surcharge is approximately 70%-75% of the total kWh price. This is considered a “pass-through” revenue because it goes directly to pay the local fuel suppliers for diesel fuel consumed at the five power plants in Tutuila, Manua and Aunuu.

The fuel surcharge rate also includes the “Renewable Reduction” from electricity produced by the ASPA Photo Voltaic panels. The avoided fuel costs or fuel being saved from producing electricity through the Photo Voltaic panels, is passed on to customers as the “Renewable

Reduction” savings. There are seven active sites, with more sites in progress to increase ASPA’s renewable energy portfolio. As ASPA increases renewable energy capacity, more savings will be realized and passed on to customers.



Murray, Jokic lead Nuggets to 124-111 win over Nets

NEW YORK (AP) — After getting a pep talk from his coach, Jamal Murray came through with a big game for the Denver Nuggets.

Murray scored 26 points, Nikola Jokic had 21 points and 14 rebounds, and the Nuggets beat the Brooklyn Nets 124-111 on Sunday. “Before the game this morning (Murray) said, ‘Coach right now I’m a broken arrow,’” Nuggets coach Mike Malone said. “I said, ‘No, you’re not. You’re going to be fine. Just stay with it. I believe in you and you have to believe in yourself.’ Tonight, he came out and imposed his will on the game and was fantastic for us.”

Wilson Chandler added 18 points for the Nuggets, who have won two straight games.

Spencer Dinwiddie tied a career-high with 22 points, Rondae Hollis-Jefferson had 18 points and Joe Harris tied his season-high with 16 points for the Nets.

The Nuggets went on a 22-4 run to begin the third quarter as Brooklyn missed 10 of its first 11 shots. Chandler carried Denver in the third with 14 points as the Nuggets took a 100-84 lead into the fourth quarter and never looked back.

“I thought that third quarter was phenomenal,” Malone said. “That was by far our best quarter of basketball on both ends of the floor. We outscored them 40-21 and to hold them to only 40 percent for the game was terrific.”

While the third quarter was Denver’s best quarter of the season, it was arguably Brooklyn’s worst of the season.

“It’s just the defensive end, really,” Harris said. “You can’t give up 40 points in one quarter. Obviously they got comfortable, came off with a little more energy than we did and that was the game right there.”

Hollis-Jefferson led Brooklyn with 16 points at the half as the Nets took a 63-60 lead into the locker room. Brooklyn’s 63 points matched a season-high for points in the first half previously done in the season opener against Indiana. Emmanuel Mudiay led Denver with 15 points at the half.

Brooklyn’s 36 first quarter points marked its most in an opening period this season.

TIP-INS

Nuggets: Malone believes his young backcourt will be the key to success this season. “The biggest challenge for us is going to be when you have a 21-year-old backup point guard

and a 20-year old starting point guard, there are going to be inconsistencies. Can we try to help them and speed up their maturation as players? Because we have big plans, we want to be a playoff team and when you have two young guards who are going through growing pains at times, it doesn’t make it always easy.” . Juancho Hernangomez (mononucleosis) was out.

Nets: Coach Kenny Atkinson said DeMarre Carroll (right ankle soreness) and Quincy Acy

(left groin strain) are day-to-day. Jeremy Lin (right knee) was also out. ... Timofey Mozgov has now made two 3-pointers in seven games, which is more than he totaled the previous two. ... Jacob Wiley made his NBA debut.

Wall, Wizards lead early and roll past Kings 110-83

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — Two consecutive fourth-quarter meltdowns put the Wizards in a hole on their current road trip. It also set the stage for Washington's most lopsided win of the season.

A defense that forced 20 turnovers and an offense that set a season high with 17 3-pointers helped, too.

John Wall scored 11 of his 19 points in the first quarter and had nine assists, Otto Porter Jr. had 16 points and the Wizards beat the Sacramento Kings 110-83 on Sunday.

"It was probably the best that we've played on both ends of the court," Washington coach Scott Brooks said. "Hopefully we can continue that trend."

The 27-point victory kept the Wizards out of the record books. Washington's first five games were decided by five points or fewer; no team had ever opened the season with six.

Wall made it a moot point early by making his first four shots, including three 3-pointers, as Washington jumped to a 13-0 lead that was never threatened.

"I haven't been shooting the ball well so far this season," Wall said. "If I make shots, teams are willing to live with that instead of letting me get into the paint and get to the basket. If I'm able to knock down shots on a consistent basis it makes our team a lot better and it makes us tougher to guard."

Bradley Beal added 15 points on 6-of-11 shooting for Washington after being fined \$50,000 by the NBA earlier in the day for his role in a fight with Draymond Green of the Golden State Warriors on Friday.

The Wizards were up 63-32 at halftime, had a 36-point

advantage early in the third quarter and prevented the Kings from getting closer than 27 the rest of the way.

Mike Scott added 13 points and Kelly Oubre Jr. had nine points and seven rebounds to help Washington snap a two-game losing streak.

Beal was surprised to be playing at all. The veteran guard expected to be suspended after the fight with Green late in the first half of Friday's 120-117 loss to the Warriors. Beal and Green received technical fouls and were ejected from the game.

"I was really happy I wasn't suspended," Beal said. "I knew I was going to get fined one way or the other. It is what it is. Now I can put this behind me."

While Beal played, Washington was without forward Markieff Morris and guard Carriek Felix. Both received one-game suspensions for coming off the bench during the fight.

Not that it mattered. The Kings shot 27.9 percent in the first half and trailed by double digits for the final 43 minutes.

"Once they got on us, our young guys got a little frantic and then the wheels kind of came off," Kings coach Dave Joerger said.

Brian Bogdanovic scored 15 while Kosta Koufos added seven points and 10 rebounds for Sacramento.

ALL THOSE 3S

Of the 85 shots attempted by Washington, 34 came from beyond the arc. That accounted for 40 percent of the Wizards' shooting. The 17 made 3-pointers were one shy of the franchise record. "We were aggressive off the dribble and they did a good job of closing in their defense," Beal said.

What defense? Seahawks and Texans combine for wild shootout

SEATTLE (AP) — It's not often Richard Sherman and Earl Thomas spew compliments of an opponent, especially a rookie.

Watching the Seattle Seahawks defense get torn apart by rookie quarterback Deshaun Watson and the Houston Texans on Sunday had Sherman, Thomas and their teammates issuing praise rarely heard from one of the top defenses in the league. "I'm not surprised at all. I think I ran my mouth too much this summer when we chilled," Thomas said of Watson. "We got the same agent, spent a lot of time together. I expect that out of him. He did that against Alabama in a big game. He tried to do it today."

Defense was optional as Watson and Seattle's Russell Wilson put together two of the best regular-season quarterback performances in league history in Seattle's wild 41-38 win over the Texans on Sunday. The Seahawks entered the week with the best scoring defense in the league, and proceeded to allow 21 points in the first 21 minutes of the game.

The 38 points was tied for the second most allowed by the Seahawks in a regular-season game since coach Pete Carroll's first season in 2010. Shootouts have not been part of Seattle's winning formula, yet Sunday showed they have the capability entirely because of Wilson.

Wilson was responsible for 472 total yards passing and running. Houston's defense had shown vulnerability, especially with the loss of J.J. Watt and Whitney Mercilus for the season due to injuries. But Wilson's performance was special, capping it by going 80 yards in barely a minute and no time-outs, and hitting Jimmy Graham on an 18-yard strike with 21 seconds left to take the lead.

Sherman and others on Seattle's defense said Wilson's performance bailed out the Seahawks. Wilson disagreed.

"It's not about bailing anybody out. It's about finding a way to win," he said.

Even more impressive is what Watson did to Seattle's defense. The Seahawks pride themselves on not allowing big plays, yet surrendered 509 total yards to Houston. The Texans had 10 plays of 20 yards or more against the Seahawks,

including touchdown passes of 72, 59 and 20 yards.

Watson was responsible for 469 yards passing and running. Watson's first five starts were fantastic. His performance against Seattle — and willingness to attack secondary stars like Sherman and Thomas — was validation that going forward he can star against any defense in any environment.

"The whole defense has a lot of playmakers, future Hall of Famers, All-Pros, a lot of veteran guys, a very good team," Watson said. "A very, very smart team. They make you earn it." Here's what else to know about the wild game:

NO RUNNING: Seattle's got to get its run game fixed. Wilson was the Seahawks leading rusher with 30 yards. The rest of Seattle's rushers combined 3 yards on 17 carries. It was a pathetic performance in the run game that would be a bigger issue if not for Wilson's late heroics. In four of seven games this season, Seattle has failed to reach 100 yards rushing as a team. "We didn't think that was going to happen at all," Seattle coach Pete Carroll said. "We wanted to get our rhythm and get going."

ALL TDs: Perhaps teams need to stop focusing the majority of their attention on DeAndre Hopkins.

Will Fuller has 13 total receptions for the season and seven of those have gone for touchdowns. He had two long TDs against Seattle, including a 59-yarder on Houston's opening drive, and another long catch down to the 2-yard line. Fuller missed the first three games due to a collarbone injury, but has been nearly unstoppable from finding the end zone since returning. "When guys want to cheat to my side, you have to watch Will and Bruce (Ellington) as well. But Will has been playing his (tail) off," Hopkins said.

PROTESTING: All but 10 members of the Texans took a knee during the national anthem, as the vast majority of the team protested the owner's "inmates running the prison" comment. Left tackle Duane Brown said a meeting with owner Bob McNair went "not too well," but the Texans were able to put aside any distraction from the issue.

Wheeler scores 3 of Jets' 5 goals in 1st to rout Pens 7-1

WINNIPEG, Manitoba (AP) — A blowout win over the two-time defending Stanley Cup champions was more important to Blake Wheeler than his own outstanding performance. Wheeler scored three of Winnipeg's five first-period goals and added an assist in the third as the Jets routed the Pittsburgh Penguins 7-1 on Sunday night.

"It's all about getting two points. I think we've got every guy pushing in that direction," he said. Brendan Lemieux scored his first career goal for Winnipeg on a slap shot from the point at 12:20 of the third. The son of Claude Lemieux made his NHL debut Oct. 20 after being called up from the Manitoba Moose of the AHL. "It feels great," he said. "Obviously, really fortunate to have been able to get one and really excited. Every day I'm up here has been a blessing and I'm just trying to run with it."

Andrew Copp, Joel Armia and Mark Scheifele also scored for the Jets, who chased Matt Murray early. Connor Hellebuyck made 31 saves.

Winnipeg (5-3-2) scored three times in a span of 34 seconds late in the first to break it open.

The Penguins (7-5-1), playing back-to-back road games after losing 2-1 in Minnesota on Saturday, were on their heels from the start and didn't score until Evgeni Malkin's fifth of the season late in the second period.

"We were fortunate to get the day off yesterday," Wheeler said. "It's tough when you're playing a back-to-back and the back end of a three (games) in four (days). It takes a little bit of time to get going and luckily we had our legs early."

The Jets have played their best hockey in the first period this season, outscoring opponents 16-8.

Pittsburgh has been out-

scored 21-10 in the opening 20 minutes.

"If I had an answer, we'd probably cure it," coach Mike Sullivan said. Copp opened the scoring with his first of the season on a short pass in the slot from linemate Sean Matthias at 1:20. The Jets remained on the attack but Murray stymied them until 13:58, when Scheifele fed Wheeler at the side of the net for his second goal of the season.

He added another at 17:44 and Murray barely had time to take his stance again before Armia made it 4-0 at 18:07. Murray was pulled and lost in regulation for the second time this season.

"It's disappointing," Sullivan said. "We talk about doing the right things. We talk about managing the puck the right way. We talk about staying on the right side of people and then we go out and our actions are just the opposite."

The hats rained down 11 seconds after that when Wheeler made it 5-0 at 18:18 with a goal against Murray's replacement, Casey DeSmith.

The Jets lost 2-1 in overtime Thursday at Pittsburgh, one of two overtime losses for them this week following a win at Minnesota. Winnipeg returned to Hellebuyck's hot hand in goal. He has all five Jets wins this season. Pittsburgh tried to regroup in the second period and outshot the Jets 15-4, thanks partly to a string of minor penalties on Winnipeg. But the Penguins not get one past Hellebuyck until Malkin scored his power-play goal at 17:02.

Scheifele scored in the third when he one-timed a pass from Wheeler during a 4-on-3 power play at 10:28 to make it 6-1. Lemieux's goal about two minutes later completed the scoring.

Winnipeg coach Paul Maurice is happy with the way his team has played defense recently, but acknowledged Sunday night was an anomaly.

Hardaway, Knicks give Cavs 4th loss in 5 games, 114-95

CLEVELAND (AP) — After the Cavaliers’ fourth loss in five games, LeBron James is turning to the calendar for comfort.

“What month is this for me? October? I’m not about to go crazy over it right now. It’s too long of a season. I’ve been a part of this way too many times,” James said after Sunday night’s 114-95 loss to the New York Knicks.

Tim Hardaway Jr. scored 34 points, Kristaps Porzingis had 32 and the Knicks won for the second time after losing their first three games.

Cleveland, which was blown out by Orlando at home and lost to Brooklyn during this stretch, fell below .500. The Cavaliers were routed 123-101 in New Orleans on Saturday.

“Tonight’s loss and the last couple are unacceptable,” coach Tyronn Lue said.

The Cavaliers are favorites to return to the NBA Finals for the fourth straight season, but their issues continued, particularly on the defensive end.

“Guys are scoring at will against us,” James said. “Our defense is pretty bad right now.”

New York, after winning its first game Friday over the Nets, led 89-71 late in the third quarter. Cleveland cut it to 94-88 on James’ drive, forcing New York to call a timeout with 8:21 left.

Courtney Lee scored on a drive and hit a 3-pointer, helping the Knicks make it 103-88. New York took its largest lead, 114-93, in the final minute.

“We could have folded against a veteran team like that, but we made some big shots and pulled it out,” New York coach Jeff Hornacek said.

New York beat Cleveland for the first time since Oct. 30, 2014 — James’ first game back with the Cavaliers after playing four seasons in Miami — a span that covered 10 games.

“It’s nice to finally beat the Cavs for the first time in my career,” Porzingis said. “Hopefully we can be in the playoffs where that really matters.”

Hardaway came in shooting 27 percent in four games but scored 24 points in the first half. He was 11 of 19 from the field and hit 5 of 10 3-pointers.

“I did a lot more attacking,” Hardaway said. “I took the 3s when they were there. Seeing one go down opens up a lot.”

Kevin Love led the Cavaliers with 22 points while James had 16. Derrick Rose returned after missing four games because of a sprained left ankle and scored 15 points.

Cleveland led 13-10, but Hardaway scored 10 points, including two 3-pointers and a dunk off an alley-oop pass from Jarrett Jack, as New York went on a 14-0 run.

Warriors handed second loss at home, fall 115-107 to Pistons

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — Stephen Curry believes the Warriors are close to being their old, dominant selves again, even if so much seems to be going wrong so far.

One night, it's offensive rebounds surrendered. Another, it's turnovers. Or, an all-out foul fest. The defending champions are showing some serious flaws — and coach Steve Kerr is calling out his team to be far more composed.

Curry and Golden State got handed a second home defeat at this early stage of the season, falling 115-107 to the Pistons on Sunday night as Avery Bradley scored 23 points for Detroit.

"It just has to matter enough. Right now it just doesn't seem to matter. Our guys are lacking in energy and focus and discipline," Kerr said.

"We finally started caring with six minutes left when we were threatened and we immediately cut it to three because we cared. But the right team won, karma was in the right place tonight."

Tobias Harris hit a 3-pointer with 1:27 remaining that all but sealed it after Kevin Durant fueled a late Warriors rally.

Durant hit consecutive 3-pointers to get Golden State

back within 101-94 then dunked the next time down to make it 103-96 with 4:40 to go before finding Thompson for a 3 on the next possession.

Durant's dunk at 2:12 made it 108-105. Curry had a steal and drive with 1:51 left but couldn't convert, then missed a 3 as Golden State kept possession. Durant missed from deep the next time down.

The Warriors lost only twice total at Oracle Arena in both their 2015 championship year and again in the 73-win season that followed, then just five times at home on the way to another title last season.

"We're really close to being ourselves," Curry said. "For the most part those little things are keeping us from really opening up the gates in games like tonight where we had a pretty comfortable lead in the third quarter."

Klay Thompson scored 29 points and became the 11th player in franchise history to eclipse 9,000 career points. Durant wound up with 28 points and Curry 27.

Stanley Johnson's dunk with 6:56 left put the Pistons up 98-88.

"When our intensity and energy rises on defense I think

we're a pretty good team," Johnson said.

Golden State looked efficient again initially, passing well and making better decisions, but it was sloppy down the stretch. The Warriors shot 57.1 percent with 29 assists and were at a 63.5-percent clip midway through the third quarter before allowing the Pistons back in the game.

Reggie Jackson scored 18 of his 22 points in the first half and Bradley made five 3-pointers for the Pistons, who impressed on the second night of a SoCal-NorCal back-to-back.

Detroit beat the Clippers 95-87 on Saturday to hand Los Angeles its first defeat and leaving no more undefeated NBA teams.

With 11 blocks, Golden State has gone seven straight games with at least seven blocks.

THOMPSON'S PLEDGE

Thompson is donating \$69,000 to Northern California fire victims and relief efforts from the devastating wildfires in the North Bay.

He pledged \$1,000 through "Points With Purpose" for each point he scored during this three-game homestand.

"I love that he's doing that on his own," Kerr said.

Steelers lean on D, Smith-Schuster in 20-15 win over Lions

DETROIT (AP) — JuJu Smith-Schuster scored on a 97-yard touchdown pass from Ben Roethlisberger late in the third quarter and the Pittsburgh Steelers forced the Detroit Lions to turn the ball over on downs twice in a 20-15 win Sunday night.

The AFC North-leading Steelers (6-2) go into their bye week with a three-game winning streak.

“We weren’t perfect, obviously, but boy we showed fight,” coach Mike Tomlin said.

Detroit (3-4) was coming off its bye and lost for the fourth time in five games.

Pittsburgh’s defense put up a curtain in front of its end zone, forcing the Lions to settle for field goals. When they went for touchdowns, the Steelers stopped them.

Detroit coach Jim Caldwell chose to go for it on fourth down from the Steelers 1 trailing by one in the third quarter. Matthew Stafford was sacked as he stepped up out of a collapsing pocket and tried to run up the middle.

“Just as I thought I could do something, I got hit,” Stafford said.

A snap after missing wide-open tight end Jesse James on the ensuing drive, Roethlisberger dropped back into his end zone and perfectly lofted a pass to Smith-Schuster. The

rookie receiver ran for about 70 yards after the catch, running past cornerback Quandre Diggs and pulling away from safety Glover Quin on his way to the end zone.

“I told him I didn’t know he had that much speed,” Roethlisberger recalled. “He said he didn’t, either.”

Matt Prater kicked his fifth field goal on the next possession after Caldwell didn’t want to go for it on another fourth down from the Pittsburgh 1, drawing boos from a crowd that included a lot of black-and-yellow clad, towel-twirling fans cheering for the visitors.

“We tried to be aggressive the first time,” Caldwell said. “And then it was later in the game, so we kicked it. We gave ourselves a chance to win the game.”

Then Golden Tate gave it away.

Detroit got the ball back with a chance to drive for a go-ahead TD, but Tate blew it with an unforced fumble at the Steelers 24. “It just slipped,” Tate said. “It was just a bad play by me.”

The Lions’ defense forced Pittsburgh to punt again and they failed to take advantage. After the 2-minute warning, Stafford threw an incomplete pass from the Pittsburgh 8.

“Our red zone defense was amazing,” Steelers defensive end Cameron Heyward said.
