Fourth-quarter run leads Clippers over Suns, 111-99

PHOENIX (AP) — Tobias Harris scored 27 points and the Los Angeles Clippers gained a little ground in the Western Conference playoff race with a 111-99 victory over the Phoenix Suns on Wednesday night.

Harris had 15 points in the third quarter, and Los Angeles pulled away early in the fourth with an 18-0 run.

The Clippers (41-34) moved to a game out of the eighth playoff spot, one game behind the Jazz after Utah’s 97-94 loss to Boston.

Austin Rivers had 18 points and eight assists, and DeAndre Jordan added 13 points and 15 rebounds for the Clippers, who have won four of five.

Tyler Ulis led Phoenix with a season-high 23 points and rookie Josh Jackson added 18. Jackson has scored 15 or more points in eight straight games, but the Suns’ losing streak reached 13 games.

The Suns were without four injured players who get regular minutes: guards Devin Booker and Elfrid Payton, center Alex Len and forward T.J. Warren. Payton, who played in Monday’s loss to Boston, was ruled out before the game with knee tenderness.

Jordan reached 7,000 points for his 10-season career with a first-quarter dunk, his first points of the game. The first quarter saw eight ties and five lead changes, but the Suns ended it ahead 32-27 on a buzzer-beating 3 from Ulis.

Rivers’ 25-footer with a second left had the Clippers in front 58-56 at halftime.

The Clippers opened the third quarter on a 12-3 run, including Rivers’ layup with 8:03 left for a 68-59 Los Angeles lead.

The Suns cut it to 80-76 after back-to-back 3s from Troy Daniels. Jackson dunked in transition to make it 85-82 going into the fourth quarter, but the Suns didn’t score until the 6:23 mark of the period.

James ties Jordan's double-figures streak; Cavs top Hornets

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) — LeBron James doesn't go into every game thinking he needs to score 10 points.

The 14-time All-Star said it just "organically happens."

It helps, of course, to be a multi-talented 6-foot-8, 250-pound forward viewed by many as the most physically talented basketball player of all-time.

The 33-year-old James matched Michael Jordan's streak of 866 consecutive double-digit scoring games on Wednesday night, scoring 41 points to help the Cleveland Cavaliers beat the Jordan-owned Charlotte Hornets 118-105 and remain in third place in the Eastern Conference.

"I can't tell you how I've been able to do it," James said. "Any time I'm mentioned with some of the greats, and arguably the greatest basketball player of all-time in Mike, it's just another feat for me to be just appreciative and humbled by what I'm able to do."

He wasn't the only one making history.

Although the game got away from the Hornets in the fourth quarter, there was still the matter of Kemba Walker attempting to pass Dell Curry

as the franchise's career scoring leader. After a sluggish three quarters, Walker scored 11 points in the fourth, including a reverse layup with 20 seconds left to break Curry's mark of 9,839 points.

"I wasn't supposed to be here," the 6-foot-1, 184-pound Walker told the crowd moments after the game ended. "... Anything is possible. If I can do it, anybody can."

Walker had to grab a towel to wipe away tears after breaking the record.

James approached Walker at midcourt as time expired, gave him a huge hug and whispered congratulations in his ear, telling him it was an incredible accomplishment.

"Listen, if you can be the all-time leading scorer in any franchise, that's incredible," James said. "That's an incredible feat. I definitely went over and just told him how incredible that was. Even though with the season that they're having, when accomplishments happen throughout the season, you try not to take them for granted. I think it's an incredible feat for him."

Jordan, who was not at the game, issued a statement through the team saying he was happy for Walker.

"Becoming a franchise's all-time leading scorer is a big accomplishment and it's a testament to his hard work, dedication and passion for the game of basketball," Jordan said. "He exemplifies what it means to be a Hornet."

Jordan did not comment on James tying his streak.

James matched Jordan's 17-year-old mark in the second quarter when he scored his 10th point on a powerful alley-oop dunk off a pass from J.R. Smith.

James, who began his streak on Jan. 6, 2007, can break Jordan's record Friday night at home against the New Orleans Pelicans.

He scored 16 points in the second quarter and 13 in the third on 10-of-15 shooting during that span, including 4 of 6 from beyond the arc as the Cavaliers built a 17-point lead heading into the fourth quarter.

The Hornets cut Cleveland's 20-point lead to 11 points but James re-entered the game and made an immediate impact with a few more highlight reel plays.

He stole Frank Kaminsky's pass near the top of the key and raced the length of the floor and threw down an emphatic one-handed dunk over Jeremy Lamb that brought the crowd to its feet again. Then with 3:09 left in the game, he grabbed Rodney Hood's miss out of the air and dunked it hard with his right hand, punctuating the Cavaliers' victory.

James left the game to a standing ovation from the Charlotte crowd, which was filled with Cavaliers fans wearing James' No. 23 jersey.

TIP INS

Hornets: Walker established a new team record with his 44th consecutive made free throw. That free throw also brought his career total to 1,999, which broke Gerald Wallace's franchise record of 1,998.

JAMES' DOMINANCE

James continued his dominance against the Hornets. He had his way against Charlotte in two previous meetings this season, combining for 58 points, 22 rebounds and 21 assists.

It was also a strong bounce-back game for James, who was limited to 18 points on 7-of-18 shooting in a lopsided loss to the Miami Heat on Tuesday night.

JORDAN'S STREAK

Jordan's streak of 866 games with at least 10 points came with the Chicago Bulls and Washington Wizards from 1986-2001.

Nets pull away in fourth to beat Magic 111-104

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — The season may be dragging for some teams at the bottom of the NBA standings, though the Brooklyn Nets are making the most of it.

The Nets put seven players in double figures, including all five starters and ran away from the Orlando Magic in the fourth quarter en route to a 111-104 victory on Wednesday night.

“Even though we lost the last few games, we’ve been playing the right way and we’re inching over the hump,” said Rondae Hollis-Jefferson, who had 14 points and nine rebounds.

D’Angelo Russell led the way for Brooklyn with 16 points and 12 assists. Caris LeVert also scored 16 and DeMarre Carroll had 14 points and 12 rebounds for the Nets, who had lost their three previous games, but finally outplayed an opponent in the fourth quarter.

“Tonight was a good display of what we should be doing to finish games,” said rookie Jarrett Allen, who contributed 15 points and eight rebounds.

The Nets outscored the Magic 17-2 to start the final period and build a 19-point lead that gave them plenty of cushion to rest on the final six minutes of the game.

“We’re going to be in the playoffs sooner rather than later,” Russell said. “It’s sad that we’re figuring things out right now, but the last few games, when everyone is making an effort to do what they do best, we’re a good team.”

The Nets led 85-81 going into the fourth quarter, after allowing the Magic to finish the third period with a 14-4 run. However, the Brooklyn defense rose to the occasion, forcing Orlando to go 0 for 11 from the field before Mario Hezonja made a layup with 5:57 left in the game.

“After giving up 30 in the third period, I told the guys this would be a game of stops and I thought our guys locked in,” Brooklyn coach Kenny Atkinson said. “We’ve been pushing to get over the hump and we got over it tonight.”

Just the opposite is happening for the Magic, who have lost nine of their last 11 games and look like they are playing out the string of their sixth straight losing season.

Nikola Vucevic led Orlando with 24 points and 15 rebounds and Hezonja had 23. Aaron Gordon added 15 points and D.J. Augustin 14, but none of them could rescue the offense during the final period drought.

It got so bad that coach Frank Vogel sent in bench players for the final four minutes of the game. They didn’t cut the deficit under 10 until the final 35 seconds of the game.

“These guys have been a tough matchup for us all year,”

said Vogel, whose team is 1-3 against Brooklyn this season. “We knew this was going to be a challenge and we certainly didn’t do a good enough job.”

Magic: G Rodney Purvis got his first NBA start after signing a contract for the rest of the season. Purvis finished two 10-day contracts with Orlando. Purvis was 0 for 6 and scored two points. . It appears the season is over for SG Evan Fournier and SF Terrence Ross, who were both attempting to return from knee injuries.

Embiid injured but 76ers down Knicks for 8th straight win

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Philadelphia's win streak became a secondary concern after Joel Embiid went down in the second quarter.

Dario Saric had 26 points and 14 rebounds and the 76ers earned their eighth straight victory despite losing Embiid to a facial injury, beating the New York Knicks 118-101 on Wednesday night.

J.J. Redick scored 21 points and Ben Simmons added 13 points, 10 assists and eight rebounds for Philadelphia (44-30), which stayed a half-game behind Cleveland for third in the Eastern Conference. The 76ers, who already clinched their first playoff appearance since 2012, have the franchise's most victories since the 2002-03 club won 48 games.

Embiid was taken to a hospital for precautionary testing after a nasty collision with teammate Markelle Fultz. The team said the All-Star center had a facial contusion, but did not have a concussion.

"I was scared," Saric said of his reaction to Embiid going down. "I hope he'll be good and he'll be ready."

Embiid averages a team-high 22.9 points and 11 rebounds per game.

Philadelphia still had enough to beat New York (27-49), which lost for the fourth time in five games. Emmanuel Mudiay and Michael Beasley had 22 points apiece for the Knicks.

"You have to play well to win on the road," Knicks coach Jeff Hornacek said. "We played well in parts."

The 76ers stretched their four-point halftime advantage to 91-77 on Saric's layup with 2:42 left in the third period. New York never threatened in the final quarter thanks in large part to Saric, who raised his game in Embiid's absence.

"He is such a big part of this team," Brown said. "He loves basketball. He is a great teammate. He is trending up."

Fultz, the No. 1 overall pick in last June's draft, played for the second straight game after sitting out for most of the season while recovering from a shoulder injury. The 19-year-old guard had three points, five rebounds and seven

assists in 13 minutes against the Knicks.

But Fultz's biggest blow came against his own teammate.

Fultz was driving toward the basket 20 seconds into the second when he appeared to accidentally head-butt Embiid. The 7-footer immediately went to the floor. As a hush came over the sold-out crowd, he remained down for several minutes before he was helped off the court.

Fultz was not injured on the play.

"I know I hit him, but I believe he is OK," Fultz said. "My heart dropped. He's a tough guy. All I can do is pray for him."

Embiid finished with five points and three rebounds in eight minutes.

FULTZ FROM THE LINE

Fultz made the first of two free throws when he went to the line with 2:47 left in the third quarter. It was his first trip to the stripe since his return.

His free-throw shooting was highly scrutinized early in the season and was the most telling sign that something was off with his shot. He is 7 for 14 from the line on the season.

"It felt great," he said. "I did a lot of practice."

HOME SWEET HOME

The 76ers have won 19 of their last 20 at home.

Walker proves doubters wrong; becomes Hornets scoring leader

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) — Kemba Walker keeps proving people wrong.

It's just what he does. When folks questioned whether the 6-foot-1 Walker was too small to become an elite NBA point guard after Charlotte selected him with the ninth pick in the 2011 NBA draft, he pushed himself to beat out D.J. Augustin as the starter.

When doubters questioned the Hornets giving him a four-year, \$48 million contract in 2015, all he did was become a two-time All-Star.

On Wednesday night, he took another step in his impressive, if not unlikely career, passing Dell Curry to become the franchise's career scoring leader with 9,841 points.

"It's super special because of all of the doubt I've gotten throughout my career and all of the criticism, but I just continue to prove them wrong," Walker said.

The emotions boiled over for Walker after he made a reverse layup with 20 seconds left in a 118-105 loss to the Cleveland Cavaliers to break the record Curry held for 26 years.

LeBron James was having one of those nights, scoring 41 points — so the outcome was already decided.

But few in the packed house had left the Spectrum Center because they wanted to see Walker — by far the city's most popular NBA player of the past decade — break the record. Once again, Walker did not disappoint, overcoming a sluggish three quarters to come alive late and finish with 21 points. Walker said he wanted to break the mark at home, rather than on the road at Washington this weekend.

Curry, a broadcaster for the Hornets and a huge Walker fan, looked down from his seat well above the court with a big, proud smile on his face.

James walked over to Walker as time expired and gave him a huge hug, whispering in his ear what an amazing accomplishment he had achieved.

Moments later Walker was being interviewed on the court and broke down, grabbing a towel to wipe away the growing tears streaming down his face.

"It was just pretty emotional," Walker said. "I really wish I would have played better earlier and we would have had a more competitive game but it's still a huge accomplishment. For my family to be here and all the fans cheering me on like that, especially because we

lost, they made it pretty special anyway."

James said Walker has a ton of respect around the league, although his Charlotte teams have struggled to consistently make the NBA playoffs and will likely miss out again this year.

"Listen, if you can be the all-time leading scorer in any franchise, that's incredible," James said. "That's an incredible feat. I definitely went over and just told him how incredible that was. Even though with the season that they're having, when accomplishments happen throughout the season, you try not to take them for granted. I think it's an incredible feat for him."

Hornets owner Michael Jordan wasn't at the game, but weighed in with a statement released through the team.

"I'm really happy for Kemba," Jordan said. "Becoming a franchise's all-time leading scorer is a big accomplishment and it's a testament to his hard work, dedication and passion for the game of basketball. He exemplifies what it means to be a Hornet. His effort, leadership and commitment to our team and the City of Charlotte is second to none. I'm proud to have him on our team."

For Walker, this was about the gratification of overcoming doubters.

"I proved them wrong again," Walker said. "That's what I'm about. I'm about working, getting better and proving people wrong. Like I said, I'm not supposed to be here. This is an unbelievable accomplishment and I'm so excited that I was able to do it tonight at home."

Teammate Marvin Williams said Walker plays harder than anyone he's seen in a Hornets uniform.

Few would disagree. The 27-year-old Walker said that is because he's never forgotten where he came from and what he went through to get to become a national champion at UConn and to get to where he is now.

"I'm from a rough place, the Bronx," Walker said. "Not a lot of people make it this far, especially as a professional athlete. I definitely know a lot of guys that played in the league that came from the Bronx but not a lot of them are a franchise all-time leading scorer. It's special and I take pride in that. I put on every single day and night for my city. My city loves me to death. I love where I'm from because if it wasn't for where I'm from, I wouldn't be the person I am today."

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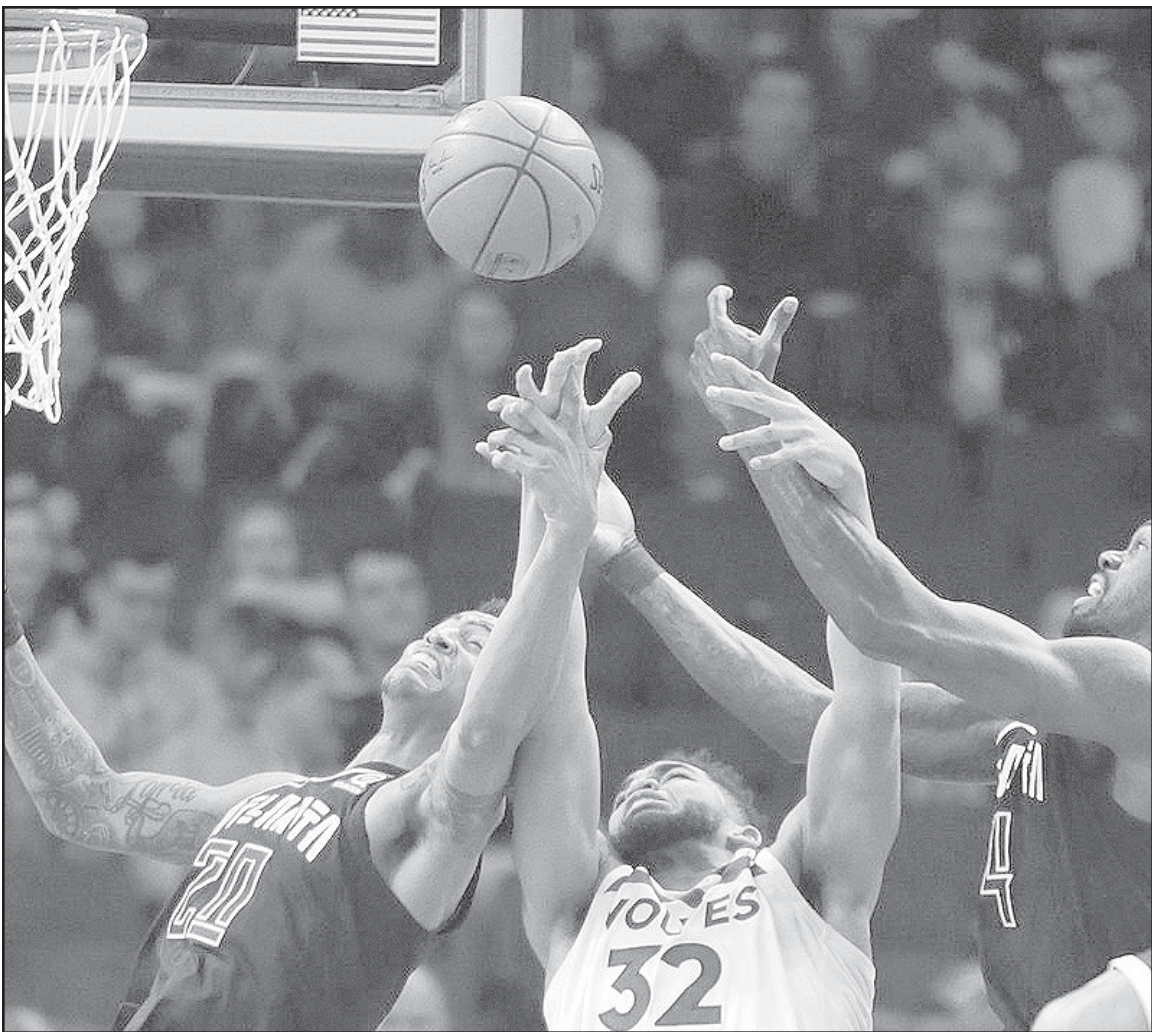

Towns’ franchise-record 56 lead Wolves over Hawks 126-114

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Karl-Anthony Towns stood up and stared at a printout of the box score of Minnesota’s game against the Atlanta Hawks.

There was a lot for Towns to admire. Towns scored a franchise-record 56 points and added 15 rebounds for his league-leading 63rd double-double, and the Timberwolves beat the Hawks 126-114 on Wednesday night.

“I just realized the ball kept coming to me more and more often,” Towns said. “I guess that was a sign to shoot the ball. Everyone just kept telling me, ‘You need six more, you need eight more, for 50.’ I wasn’t really thinking about that. I was just trying to find a way to win.”

Towns was 6 of 8 from 3-point range and added four assists for Minnesota, which recovered after a disappointing loss Monday to the lowly Memphis Grizzlies and trailing last-place Atlanta throughout the first quarter.

Towns shot 19 of 32 from the field and 12 of 15 from the free throw line. He had 30 points and 11 rebounds in the second half.

“You just start passing, sitting back and just watching,” teammate Andrew Wiggins said. “Just watching the show.”

Wiggins added 17 points and Jeff Teague had 11 points and eight assists for the Timberwolves, who avoided a third straight loss by shooting 53.3 percent, including 13 of 30 from behind the arc. Minnesota (43-33) pulled ahead of Utah into seventh place in the West after the Jazz lost at home to Boston.

Mike Muscala had a career-high 24 points off the bench for Atlanta, which stayed within striking distance of the Wolves by hitting 13 of 27 from 3. Dewayne Dedmon had 13 points and 12 rebounds for the Hawks. Atlanta has lost 10 of its past 11 games.

“We went on a good little run there,” Muscala said. “I thought we moved it well in transition and got some good looks from 3 and everything, and guards did a good job penetrating, finding open shooters and finishing at the rim. But yeah, obviously huge game for KAT and they also hit some really timely 3s, too.”

The Wolves stretched the lead to 16 in the second half, but the Hawks started to chip away in the fourth. Isaiah Taylor had nine points and Atlanta went on a 14-4 run to close within 110-104 on a 3 by Muscala.

Towns missed five shots during the run. But he went back to work and finished with his first 50-point game and the fourth in team history.

“I think the biggest thing that stands out is the way he shot the

3-ball,” Atlanta coach Mike Budenholzer said. “To go 6 for 8, his size, is just impressive. Then he gets fouled on a 3-point shot, that’s 21 points right there just outside the 3-point line for a guy that’s 6-10, 6-11, 7-feet, whatever he is.”

TIP-INS

Hawks: Starting SG Damion Lee left the game with a dislocated pinkie finger on his right hand, according to the team’s Twitter account, but later returned. ... PG Dennis Schroder missed his second straight game with a left ankle sprain. ... Atlanta now has 835 3s this season, adding to its franchise record. The Hawks started the day 10th in the league in 3s per game.

Timberwolves: PG Derrick Rose missed his fourth straight game with a sprained right ankle. C Cole Aldrich missed his second straight game with an illness. ... All-Star Jimmy Butler took shots in practice and has been trying to work his way back from meniscus surgery on his right knee. Coach Tom Thibodeau said Butler still hasn’t been cleared for contact and there is no timetable for his return. ... Tre Jones was named Mr. Basketball as the top prep player in Minnesota in an announcement during the third period. Jones, the brother of Wolves G Tyus Jones, is set to play at Duke next year, following in Tyus’ footsteps. ... Minnesota has allowed its opponents to hit 53 3s over the past four games and at least 12 a game in five of the last six games.

A BIT UNLIKELY

While Towns entered the game averaging 20.7 points this season and 21.4 per game for his career, the big night was a bit of an aberration. The All-Star center set a career high with the 32 field-goal attempts, four more than any previous game. Towns entered the game third on the Wolves in shots per game this season behind Butler and Wiggins. Towns was averaging 13.9 shots per game.

“I’m not used to shooting that many shots,” Towns said.

MUSCALA’S CAREER NIGHT

Muscala had his big night back in Minneapolis, where he grew up in nearby suburb of St. Louis Park. He was 8 of 10 from the floor, including 4 of 6 from 3. He also had to defend Towns for part of the night.

“It’s a little bittersweet,” Muscala said. “Obviously lost and couldn’t get more stops on Karl-Anthony Towns, but it was still a fun game, I feel like. Give the fans some good things to watch and it was cool to have family and friends in the stands.”

DENTON, Texas (AP) — North Texas got physical, and now the young Mean Green get to play for a championship on their home court.

Ryan Woolridge had two steals that he turned into break-away layups during North Texas’ decisive run in the second half, and the Mean Green beat San Francisco 69-55 on Wednesday night to force a deciding Game 3 in the College Basketball Invitational final.

“We got back to being ourselves and the more aggressive team,” said freshman Zachary Simmons, who had 12 points and seven rebounds.

The Mean Green (19-18) forced 16 turnovers, while committing only three of their own, and had 15-5 advantage in second-chance points bolstered by 16 offensive rebounds. They outscored San Francisco 14-0 on fast-break points — and 42-18 in the paint.

Jordan Duffy had 15 points and nine rebounds for North Texas, which didn’t play any seniors. Roosevelt Smart had 13 points and Tope Arikawe finished with 10. Woolridge had seven points with five assists.

“We were a more physical team, we got communication in transition,” Smart said.

Souley Boum had 16 points for San Francisco (22-16), while Frankie Ferrari had 10.

The Mean Green missed 12 straight shots from the field over a span of nearly 7 minutes before Arikawe’s tiebreaking layup with 29 seconds left made it 33-31 at halftime. They also scored the first 10 points in the second half. Woolridge’s second steal and layup to cap the bigger 16-3 spurt made it 49-34 with just over 12 minutes left. “They were just really tough and physical on their own floor,” USF coach Kyle Smith said. “They were lucky to be honest because they didn’t

shoot the ball great. But they really made up with it with their effort on the offensive glass.”

UNT shot 40 percent overall (27 of 68).

Game 3 is Friday night, back in the Super Pit on the North Texas campus. San Francisco won 72-62 in the opener of the best-of-three series Monday night. “This will be good for us, good for both teams,” Smith said. “Someone gets to come out of here with a championship.”

BIG PICTURE

San Francisco: The Dons, who won back-to-back NCAA titles in 1955 and 1956 and were NIT champs in 1949, are looking to become the first NCAA Division I team to win three different postseason tournaments. This is their third CBI appearance.

North Texas: With their 19th win in coach Grant McCasland’s first season, the Mean Green have already won 11 games more than last season and assured that they will not have a losing season. Their last .500 record was 16-16 in 2013-14, and their last winning season was an 18-14 record in 2011-12.

SHORT LEAD

San Francisco led only once, at 13-11 after Remu Raitanen’s second consecutive 3 nearly 7 minutes into the game. UNT took a timeout and got a 3 from Smart. After Jimbo Lull’s jumper made it 31-all with 3 1/2 minutes left, the Dons had a turnover, missed three shots and missed the front end of a 1-and-1 attempt with 7 seconds left.

UP NEXT

This is the ninth time in the 11 CBI tournaments that the final series has needed all three games to determine the champion. The deciding game comes the night before the start of the NCAA Final Four in San Antonio, about a 5-hour drive south on I-35 from the North Texas campus.

Brown scored 21 points and Jayson Tatum added 16 for the Celtics, who won their fifth straight despite a short-handed roster.

With Kyrie Irving out after knee surgery and Marcus Morris and Al Horford sidelined with ankle injuries, the Celtics finished a 4-0 trip.

Donovan Mitchell scored 22 points for Utah. Ricky Rubio had 14 points, 10 assists and eight rebounds, and Jae Crowder added 16 points.

CAVALIERS 118, HORNETS 105
CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) — LeBron James matched Michael Jordan's streak of 866 consecutive double-digit scoring games with 41 points, leading Cleveland to the road win.

James finished 14 of 26 from the field and had 10 rebounds and eight assists for the Cavaliers, who remained ahead of Philadelphia for the third-best record in the Eastern Conference.

The 33-year-old James, who began his streak on Jan. 6, 2007, can break Jordan's record Friday night at home against New Orleans.

Kemba Walker scored 21 points to pass Dell Curry as the Hornets' career scoring leader.

Walker received a big hug from James after breaking the mark with 20 seconds left on a reverse layup.

76ERS 118, KNICKS 101
PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Dario Saric had 26 points and 14 rebounds, and the Sixers won their eighth straight game despite losing All-Star Joel Embiid to a facial injury.

J.J. Redick scored 21 points for Philadelphia (44-30), which stayed a half-game behind Cleveland for third in the Eastern Conference. The 76ers, who already clinched their first playoff appearance since 2012, have the franchise's most victories since the 2002-03 club won 48 games.

Embiid was taken to a hospital for precautionary testing after a nasty collision with teammate Markelle Fultz early in the second quarter. The team said he had a facial contusion, but did not have a concussion.

Philadelphia still had enough to beat New York (27-49), which lost for the fourth time in five games. Emmanuel Mudiay and Michael Beasley had 22 points apiece for the Knicks.

Brooks made each of his four 3-point attempts in the final period in his first NBA appearance since April 16, 2014, with the Lakers. He signed a 10-day contract with Memphis on Tuesday.

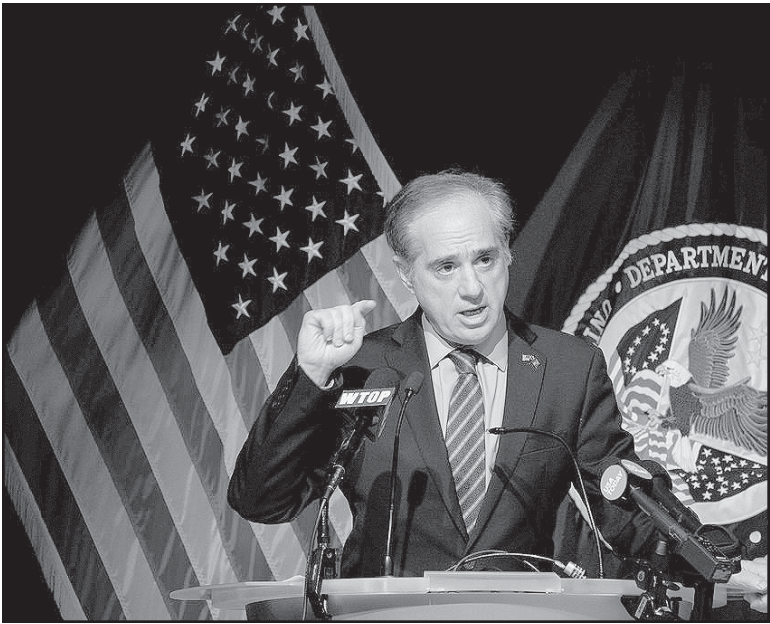

Mexico arrests 6 suspects in killing of journalist

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Six suspects have been arrested in the January killing of a journalist in the border city of Nuevo Laredo, Mexican prosecutors said Wednesday. Meanwhile, two former police officers were sentenced in the 2015 killing of another reporter in the Gulf coast state of Veracruz. The Jan. 13 stabbing of Carlos Dominguez Rodriguez may have been related to his journalistic work but was not related to organized crime, prosecutors in the northern state of Tamaulipas said. “The results up to this time indicate a probable link between these events and the exercise of freedom of expression,” the federal Attorney General’s Office added in a statement. Across from Laredo, Texas, Nuevo Laredo is dominated by the Northeast cartel and has been the scene of recent shootouts. State prosecutor Irving Barrios said that the motive for Dominguez Rodriguez’s killing was still under investigation, but that the journalist didn’t write about organized crime topics. Barrios said three of the six suspects “worked in the information industry, but we are still checking whether they were working journalists.” Officials refused to release the names of the suspects, citing Mexican law that prohibits publicly incriminating people until they are found guilty. Prosecutors did not explain why the suspects, who local media reported worked as independent journalists, would have wanted to kill Dominguez Rodriguez, or why the killing was so brutal. The victim was stabbed two dozen times in front of relatives. Prosecutors in Veracruz announced later in the day that two former police officers were sentenced to 25 years in prison for the 2015 murder of another journalist. The state prosecutor’s office said the officers were members of the Medellin police force when they participated in killing Moises Sanchez Cerezo. The Committee to Protect Journalists applauded the sentences, but called for authorities to identify others involved.

The doctor is in: White House physician nominated to lead VA

By HOPE YEN and ZEKE MILLER, Associated Press WASHINGTON (AP) — President Donald Trump fired Veterans Affairs Secretary David Shulkin and nominated White House doctor Ronny Jackson to replace him in the wake of a bruising ethics scandal and a mounting rebellion within the agency. A Navy rear admiral, Jackson is a surprise choice to succeed Shulkin, a former Obama administration official and the first nonveteran to head the VA. Trump had been considering replacements for

Shulkin for weeks but had not been known to be considering Jackson for the role. In a statement, Trump praised Jackson as “highly trained and qualified.” It was a decision that signaled Trump chose to go with someone he knows and trusts, rather than the candidate with the longest resume, to run a massive agency facing huge bureaucratic challenges. Jackson has served since 2013 as the physician to the president, one of the people in closest proximity to Trump day in and day out. His profile rose after he conducted a sweeping

press conference about the president’s medical exam in January in which he impressed Trump with his camera-ready demeanor and deft navigation of reporters’ questions as he delivered a rosy depiction of the president’s health, according to a person familiar with the president’s thinking but not authorized to discuss private conversations. Jackson eagerly embraced the idea of moving to the VA, according to a White House official who spoke on condition of anonymity to discuss personnel matters. Ironically, it was Shulkin who had recommended Jackson for an undersecretary position at the agency in fall. Jackson was vetted during that time on his policy positions and other issues, the official said. The promotion of Jackson marks the latest Trump hire to be driven at least as much by personal familiarity with the president as by his vision for the role at government’s second-largest department, responsible for 9 million military veterans in more than 1,700 government-run health facilities. Brig. Gen. Dr. Richard Tubb, who trained Jackson, said in a letter read at Jackson’s briefing that the doctor had been attached like “Velcro” to Trump since Inauguration Day. “On any given day,” he wrote, “the ‘physician’s office,’ as it is known, is generally the first and last to see the President.”

The presence of Enterococci in the water indicates contamination by human and/or animal wastes. Swimming in water with high levels of Enterococci may cause stomach problems, skin rashes, and ear, eye, and wound infections. To reduce your risk: avoid swallowing beach water, be sure to rinse or towel off after a swim, and shower once at home. If you are ill, or think you may be ill, AS-EPA advises that you consult a physician before making any water contact in the beaches cited above.

Note: AS-EPA monitors the water quality of 44 recreational beaches on Tutuila, the wharf in Aunu'u, and five beaches on Manu'a. Tutuila advisories are issued weekly on Wednesdays. Aunu'u and Manu'a advisories are issued monthly. Advisories are issued when bacteria concentrations exceed levels determined safe for human exposure. MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) — With a 10-day contract to make an impression, MarShon Brooks got off to a very nice start.

Brooks scored 14 of his 21 points in the fourth quarter in his first game with Memphis, helping the last-place Grizzlies beat the Portland Trail Blazers 108-103 on Wednesday night.

Brooks made each of his four 3-point attempts in the final period in his first NBA appearance since April 16, 2014, with the Lakers. He signed a 10-day contract with Memphis on Tuesday.

"You don't really have time to get comfortable on a 10-day. You just don't," Brooks said. "Thank God I made shots. That helps." Brooks, who averaged 36.6 points for the Jiangsu Dragons of the Chinese Basketball Association this year, was 7 for 12 from the field.

Dillon Brooks had 18 points for the Grizzlies (21-54), who trailed 93-86 with 7 minutes left. Chandler Parsons finished with 15 in Memphis' second straight win.

CJ McCollum led Portland (46-29) with 42 points, and Wade Baldwin IV added 15 points on 5-for-6 shooting.

The Trail Blazers went 3 for 8 at the line in the final 7 minutes. A handful of turnovers in the fourth only made matters worse.

"In the fourth quarter, you have to make free throws," Portland coach Terry Stotts said. "You can't miss free throws, and you have to guard better. You can't give up 32 points in the fourth quarter and have turnovers and missed free throws. Not going to win many games like that."

Trail Blazers star Damian Lillard, who had 41 points in Tuesday's win over New Orleans, was not with the team after the birth of his son.

LAS VEGAS (AP) — Kevin Connauton scored twice to lead the Arizona Coyotes over the Vegas Golden Knights 3-2 on Wednesday night.

It marked Arizona's first victory over the expansion Golden Knights in the teams' fifth and final game this season.

Richard Panik also scored for the Coyotes, and Antti Raanta improved to 18-16-6 by making 27 saves.

The Coyotes began the season 0-10-1 and were 9-27-5 heading into 2018, but

now they're on a 15-7-2 roll, including an impressive 4-1 victory at Eastern Conference-leading Tampa Bay on Monday night. Arizona is 6-3-1 in its last 10 road games. Erik Haula and Alex Tuch scored for the playoff-bound Golden Knights. Marc-Andre Fleury stopped 29 shots. Both Golden Knights' goals came on a power play, as they continued their hot streak with a man advantage.

The Coyotes opened the scoring when Connauton found the loose puck after a deflection in front of the crease and backhanded it in a wide open net.

Vegas is just 7-6-3 in its last 16 games and holds a five-point lead over surging San Jose for first place in the Pacific Division. The Sharks were idle Wednesday and visit Vegas on Saturday night. The Golden Knights are 27-10-2 at home this season. Vegas tied it after James Neal took advantage of a turnover and fed Haula for a one-timer. With a little more than three minutes left in the first period, Clayton Keller stole the puck, maneuvered around the defense and served an attacking Panik, whose backhand beat Fleury.

I do, however, expect Ron to participate in raising our kids and contribute to the running of our household. I think it's important, and I have work responsibilities and volunteer in our community. Ron says I do far less than "most of my friends" (who don't work), that he does a lot more around the house than the dads he knows and he resents it because he makes so much more money than I do. How much is fair to expect him to do to help with our kids and home life? How can I get him to see how much hurt his name-calling and disrespect causes? -- NOT A FREELOADER

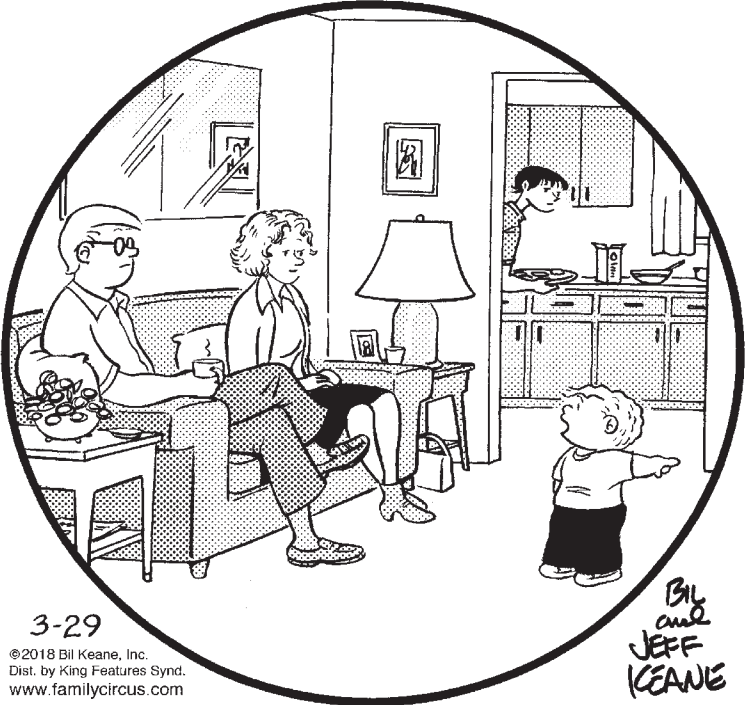

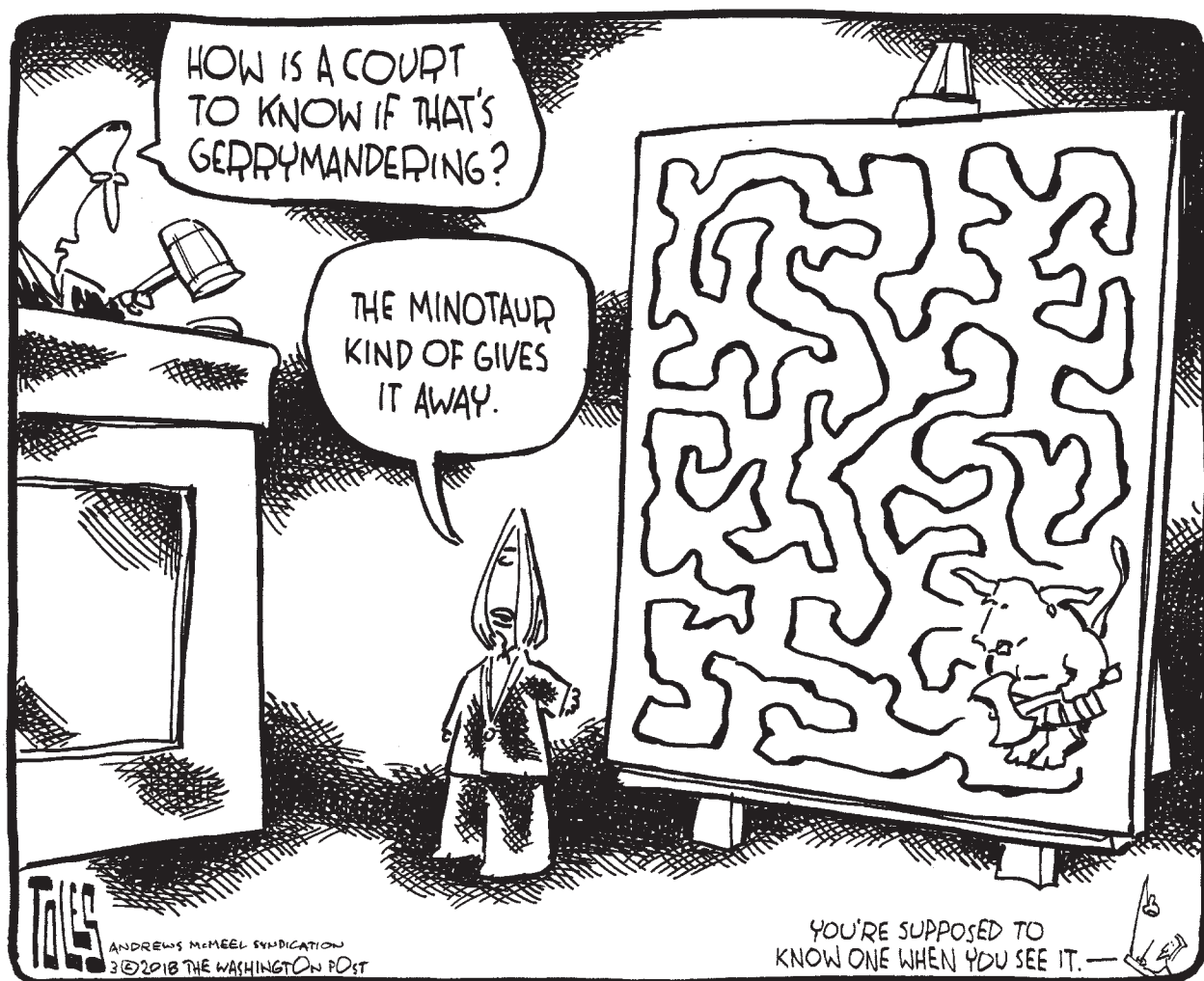
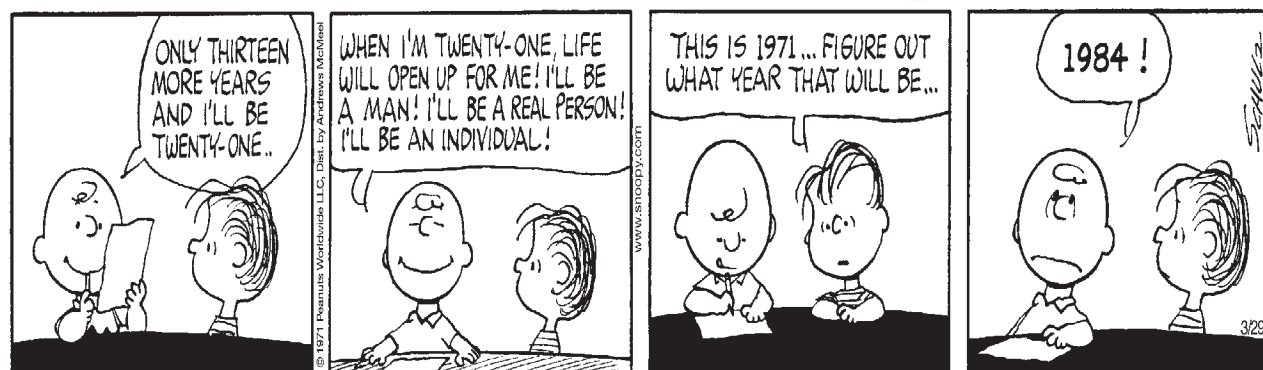
