Warriors and Cavs benefit from rest, NBA tries to reduce it

In bulldozing their respective conferences through the first three rounds of the post-season, the Cleveland Cavaliers and Golden State Warriors each earned an extended rest before their highly anticipated showdown in the NBA Finals begins on Thursday.

Both teams appear to be playing their best basketball at the most important time. One of the reasons cited is the strategic rest days given to star players sporadically through the long regular season.

Known in the league as “DNP-Rest,” the practice of sitting healthy players to avoid injury and fatigue has grown in popularity as teams focus more on reducing the wear and tear on the stars that drive the league. And while forward-thinking teams have been praised for putting the player first, there is concern across the league that the approach threatens to alienate fans who pay to see their favorite players, aggravate network executives who paid billions to showcase games, and devalue the regular season.

“We don’t rest. I don’t believe in it,” Miami Heat president Pat Riley said in April. “I think it’s gotten to the point where it’s become a travesty, an absolute travesty. Blatantly. I don’t care how many players you’re resting or who. Who are the ones entitled to get the rest versus who doesn’t rest? We don’t rest.”

Riley had reason to be upset. After an 11-30 start to the season, the Heat rebounded to win 30 of their last 41 games to surge back into playoff contention. Heading into the final day of the season, the Heat needed a win over the Washington Wizards and a Chicago loss to Brooklyn or a Pacers loss to the Hawks to get into the Eastern Conference field as the eighth seed. But the Nets sat Jeremy Lin, Trevor Booker and Brook Lopez, essentially handing the game to the Bulls.

During the regular season, there were 203 instances of a healthy player sitting out of a game, according to data compiled by instreetclothes.com , a website run by certified athletic trainer Jeff Stotts that has analyzed injuries for years. Ten years ago, there were only 12 such instances.

“It’s not my preference to rest. I do understand rest and why you do it,” said Kevin Garnett, who missed one game or none in nine of his first 10 seasons, but needed to incorporate rest days more often later in his career. “It’s the way of the league, and I think the prestige of playing 82 is not what it’s used to be, and this is the way it’s going to be.”

And it’s not just star players on teams trying to preserve

themselves for deep playoff runs that are getting the treatment. The Suns sat Eric Bledsoe for the final 14 games of the season, while Tyson Chandler did not play after the All-Star break. The Lakers shut down Timofey Mozgov and Luol Deng for the final 15 games while trying to hold on to their lottery pick, and the Nets may have had the biggest head-scratcher by not playing three key players despite the importance of the game’s outcome.

“Personally I think it is a legit concern,” said Timberwolves owner Glen Taylor, chairman of the NBA’s board of governors. “I look at it as an owner for my fans. Fans come and certainly they want our team to win. But they like to beat the star on the other team. They like to see them out there. They like to see a competitive game. So first of all my concern is for my fans that we play as many players as we can, that we play to win.”

Taylor said there were also concerns after the league started a 10-year, \$24 billion television deal with Turner and ABC/ESPN. Several nationally televised games were diluted because of key players resting. It reached a crescendo over consecutive Saturdays in March when the Cavaliers and Warriors both sat stars for ESPN games.

Commissioner Adam Silver sent a letter to all 30 owners imploring them to take a more active role in the decision-making process, saying it can “damage the perception of our game.”

But the strategy paid off, particularly for the Warriors, who won 14 straight to sew up the No. 1 seed in the West after a loss against San Antonio when Stephen Curry, Klay Thompson

and Draymond Green sat out.

And according to instreetclothes.com, total games missed due to injury or illness declined for the third straight season to

4,198, the lowest number since the league did away with injured reserve for the 2005-06 season. Riley’s Heat led the league in games missed to injury, a

number inflated by Chris Bosh missing all 82 with a blood clot issue.


The increase in rest games seems directly correlated to the 2013-14 season, when the league lost nearly 5,000 games to injury or illness. Teams rested healthy players for 46 games that year, but it spiked to 86 the following season and 146 in 2015-16.

“It’s a difficult thing because you can’t tell players to play if they’re injured,” Taylor said. “People do get tired on back to backs. So I think you have to go back to your coaches and people running the teams and tell them to use their best judgment.”

Taylor said the league’s schedule makers will work more closely with the networks, trying to reduce travel surrounding nationally televised games while encouraging teams that do rest their stars to do it during home games.

The league also will start the regular season a week early next year to reduce the number of back to backs and stretches of four games in five nights.

“I think you just have to ask people to understand where the money is coming from,” Taylor said. “It’s coming from TV and the fans, and we have a responsibility.”

3 homers, Hill lead Dodgers over Cards 5-1, 5th win in row

ST. LOUIS (AP) — With every ball that sails over the fence, Los Angeles Dodgers manager Dave Roberts gets a little more encouraged that his lineup is finding its groove.

Not that the rookie leading the charge seems to be feeling any pressure.

Cody Bellinger, Chase Utley and Logan Forsythe hit solo home runs, leading Rich Hill and the Dodgers over the St. Louis Cardinals 5-1 Monday for their fifth straight victory.

“We’re starting to hit the ball out of the ballpark,” Roberts said. “To see Logan get a homer, obviously Cody’s been doing it. Chase (Utley has had) really quality at-bats and starting to hit the ball out of the ballpark, but I think if you look at our lineup, there’s guys that are really grinding that aren’t swinging the way we’re capable of.”

Los Angeles is within a half-game of the Colorado Rockies for the NL West lead, and they’ve powered nearer to the top of the standings behind Bellinger’s early contributions.

Bellinger connected in the fourth — it was his ninth home run in May, tying Joc Pederson and James Loney for the Dodgers rookie record for home runs in a month. Bellinger leads the team with 11 home runs and 29 RBIs, thriving in his first exposure in the major leagues.

“I just try to be consistent every day,” Bellinger said. “Sometimes in the outfield I kind of just look around, but, yeah, it’s real, and I just try to keep going.”

Hill (2-2) recovered from a bout of wildness in his last start to pitch five innings, giving up one run and two hits. In his previous outing, also against the Cardinals, he permitted five runs on four hits and seven walks in four innings.

Hill held the Cardinals hitless until Aledmys Diaz singled to lead off the fifth.

“We made some adjustments this week, mechanical adjustments, and proved to be successful and feel much more comfortable where I’m at now,” Hill said. “Getting my hand out of my glove, getting timing down, and all that stuff was huge.”

Mike Leake (5-3) entered the game leading the majors with a 1.91 ERA, but allowed a season-high four runs in 6 2/3 innings.

“He’s been terrific. Seven innings and six hits, he gives us a chance there,” Cardinals manager Mike Matheny said. “We just couldn’t get anything going offensively. Those are the days we need to offensively pick him up because he’s been so shutdown.”

Los Angeles got all the offense it needed in the third as Utley opened with his third home run of the season and second against St. Louis. Corey Seager later drove in Yasiel Puig with a two-out single.

Puig’s sacrifice fly in the seventh snapped Leake’s streak of nine quality starts to open the season.

Paul DeJong got two hits in his first career major league start after making his debut

Sunday for the Cardinals.

Brandon Morrow pitched a scoreless bottom of the ninth in his season debut for the Dodgers after having his contract purchased from Triple-A Oklahoma City.

FLORIDA BOUND

The Cardinals optioned OF Randal Grichuk to High-A Palm Beach before the game. He was batting .222 with four home runs and 19 RBIs, and had just five hits in 37 at bats with 14 strikeouts in his last 11 games. He hit 24 homers for St. Louis last year. The Cardinals want him to work on his plate approach at a lower level, rather than at Triple-A.

TRAINER’S ROOM

Dodgers: LHP Alex Wood was put on the 10-day disabled list retroactive to May 27 with inflammation in a joint in his upper body.

Cardinals: LHP Zach Duke threw a side session in extended spring training as he continues to recover from elbow surgery in October. ... OF Jose Martinez was activated from the disabled list prior to the game after missing 18 games with a left groin strain sustained on May 6 at Atlanta.

UP NEXT

Dodgers: RHP Kenta Maeda (4-2, 5.08 ERA) is scheduled to face the Cardinals for his second straight start. He is 2-0 with a 4.22 ERA in two career starts versus St. Louis.

Cardinals: RHP Michael Wacha (2-2, 3.66 ERA) is 2-0 with a 2.35 ERA in five starts at home this season.

Kerr not well yet, but hasn't ruled himself out for Game 1

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — Steve Kerr expects to decide soon whether he will coach the Golden State Warriors at all in the NBA Finals, saying Monday he is not yet ready but hasn't ruled himself out for Game 1.

"As of right now I would not coach Thursday night. It's still up in the air. Still waiting for 'Ahhhhhh!'" Kerr said, reaching his hands to the sky as if to receive some miracle healing. "It's coming, it's coming. ... I think once we get to Game 1, that might be a good time to make a decision one way or the other."

Golden State, unbeaten this postseason at 12-0 with sweeps of Houston, Utah and San Antonio, hosts the defending champion Cleveland Cavaliers in Games 1 and 2 on Thursday and Sunday.

The reigning NBA Coach of the Year is still not feeling well after a May 5 procedure at Duke University to repair a spinal fluid leak stemming from back surgery complications nearly two years ago. He filled in addressing the media Monday when acting coach Mike Brown was out with the flu.

"I told the team the good news is the team is really healthy, the bad news is the coaching staff is dropping like flies," Kerr joked.

Brown has been coaching the Warriors since Game 3 of the first-round playoff series at Portland, with Kerr assisting at practice and from the locker room before and during games. Brown was expected back Tuesday.

"Mike's been amazing. It's an awkward situation, again this is so unique," Kerr said. "I'm not sure it's ever happened. ... It's just weird because on the one hand Mike has to coach the team as he sees fit. I'm taking part in practices, helping with the messaging, taking part in coaching meetings, but I'm not on the sidelines during games. And so he has to make those decisions as if it's his team, but he's also taking my advice and counsel behind the scenes. So it's not easy, but he's obviously doing a good job. There seems to be a theme when I'm out, I think the team is like 108-2."

Brown is set to go up against LeBron James and a Cleveland team he coached in two separate stints.

Brown wasn't around during the past two Finals when the Warriors faced the Cavaliers, so he has watched some of last year's Finals. Kerr recently reviewed all seven games from 2016, when Golden State squandered a 3-1 lead and missed a repeat championship.

Everything he can do to help Golden State get prepared, Kerr is doing — until he feels he might be fine to return to the bench.

"I'm not well enough to coach a game and I know that (because) I coached all 82 games and I did OK. I was uncomfortable and in a lot of pain but I did fine, I could make it through," he said. "The first two games of the Portland series, whatever happened, things got worse. You saw me in the fourth quarter of Game 2, I could not sit still in my chair, it was that much pain. I would say I've gotten a little bit better, that's why I'm here talking to you right now, but you can probably tell I'm not sitting here happy-go-lucky."

Sale gets warm reception in return to Chicago with Red Sox

CHICAGO (AP) — Chris Sale smiled as he talked about his time in Chicago. The White Sox praised Sale's work ethic and attitude, and Boston Red Sox manager John Farrell called him a true competitor and great teammate.

There was lots of love for Sale on Monday, from every corner of his longtime home.

The left-hander received a warm welcome in his return to Chicago following his trade to Boston last winter. The White Sox saluted Sale with a highlight video during the first inning of their 5-4 victory against the Red Sox, and the pitcher waved to the cheering crowd, pointed to the home dugout and patted his heart.

"I had a lot of good times here — a lot of friends still over there," said Sale, who pitches against his former team for the first time on Tuesday night. "I stopped in on my way in to say hey to a few guys. I don't want to bother anybody over there, but I still want to go see them, say hey to them, tell them I miss them, stuff like that. This is where I spent the first six, seven years of my career, so a lot of good memories. It was fun walking back in here and thinking about some of those."

The 28-year-old Sale developed into one of the game's most dominant pitchers during his time with the White Sox, making the All-Star team in each of the last five years. It has been more of the same so far with the Red Sox, with Sale striking out at least 10 in eight

of his first 10 starts with his new team.

"He's about one thing, and that's about winning," Farrell said. "So we're grateful he's in our uniform."

Sale is 4-0 with a 3.57 ERA in five May starts, helping Boston keep up with the New York Yankees in the challenging AL East. Not only does he get his former team in his next start, but he also runs up against fellow lefty and good friend Jose Quintana in what is sure to be a somewhat awkward reunion for everyone involved.

"Throwing on the same day will be a different feeling for me because he was the best teammate I ever played with," Quintana said. "It will be a different feeling watching him go against me after the last four years when he was my teammate. We talked last night. He said: 'Hey, I'm in town. I can't wait to see you guys.' So I'm excited to play against him."

The White Sox selected Sale with the 13th pick in the 2010 draft out of Florida Gulf Coast University. He made his major league debut that same season, pitching out of the bullpen down the stretch.

The 6-foot-6 Sale didn't make his first start until his third year in the majors, but he took off from there. He went 70-47 with a 3.04 ERA from 2012-2016, averaging 10 strikeouts per nine innings.

"He's one of the top 10 pitchers in the world," said White Sox pitching coach Don Cooper, who forged a close

bond with Sale during his time in Chicago. "There's always the discussion 'Who's this, who's that,' but all I know is he's got to be in the top 10 of everybody on the planet."

But the fiery Sale clashed with White Sox management at times, including a five-day suspension last year for taking scissors to throwback uniforms he said were uncomfortable. He also complained during spring training about new limits on Adam LaRoche's son hanging around the clubhouse, a management decision that prompted LaRoche to retire.

Perhaps most importantly, the White Sox finished with a losing record in each of the last four years. Looking to jumpstart his rebuilding project, general manager Rick Hahn traded Sale to the Red Sox last December for a package of four prospects that included highly regarded slugger Yoan Moncada.

"Can't change the past, just try to become better in the future," Sale said. "Appreciative of my time here, the people I met here, the relationships I built, most of the things I did here, too. I'm appreciative of everybody involved that got me to this point right here. Without a lot of people in this building I wouldn't be sitting here right now, that's for sure."

Sale still keeps in touch with a couple players on the White Sox. He said he isn't sure what it's going to be like pitching against his former team, but he is looking forward to it.

Sweet relief! Gsellman leads Mets to 4-2 win over Brewers

NEW YORK (AP) — Hours after the Mets ticketed him for the bullpen, rookie Robert Gsellman pitched seven innings of three-hit ball and had two RBIs to lead New York past the Milwaukee Brewers 4-2 on Monday.

Rene Rivera and Michael Conforto each hit an RBI double during a three-run fifth against starter Matt Garza (2-2). Sandwiched in between, Gsellman drove in the go-ahead run with a sacrifice fly.

He also drew a bases-loaded walk from reliever Rob Scahill in the sixth, the eighth for New York this season after totaling three last year.

Wilmer Flores added three hits for the Mets, who had a quick turnaround after landing in New York at 2 a.m. following Sunday night's victory at Pittsburgh. Still, they handed the surprising NL Central leaders their sixth loss in eight games as the teams opened a four-game series.

Before the game, general manager Sandy Alderson said Gsellman (3-3) probably is headed back into a struggling bullpen when injured starters Steven Matz and Seth Lugo come off the disabled list, likely after one more minor league rehab outing apiece.

"We do think he can help us there," Alderson said about Gsellman. "With a 5.00 ERA in the bullpen, a lot of people can help us."

The relief corps came

through this time, though.

Rookie right-hander Paul Sewald fanned two in a perfect eighth, and Addison Reed got three outs for his seventh save in nine chances. Reed, who blew a save opportunity in his previous outing Saturday at Pittsburgh, gave up consecutive singles to start the

ninth before retiring the next two batters — including two strikeouts.

Domingo Santana homered on an 0-2 pitch from Gsellman, one day after hitting Milwaukee's first grand slam of the season during Sunday's victory over Arizona.

That was the only earned

run Gsellman permitted. He struck out five and walked two. Mets shortstop Asdrubal Cabrera committed a throwing error that led to the Brewers' first run on an RBI groundout by Keon Broxton. Cabrera, however, made amends with a single to start New York's three-run fifth.

Garza gave up four runs and seven hits in 5 2/3 innings. Milwaukee swept three games from the Mets at home May 12-14.

TRAINER'S ROOM

Brewers: Slumping 1B-OF Eric Thames made his fourth start of the year in left field after getting a day off Sunday. He went 0 for 3 with a walk and is hitless in his last 19 at-bats.

Mets: 2B Neil Walker was rested in favor of Flores. ... Rivera crouched in pain after getting hit on the right wrist but remained in the game. ... Matz and Lugo have both been sidelined all season with elbow trouble. ... Alderson said the team hopes slugger Yoenis Cespedes (strained left hamstring) will be ready to come off the disabled list in a week to 10 days — perhaps in time to be the DH during a two-game series at Texas that begins June 6.

One day after his 27th birthday, Mets RHP Tyler Pill (0-1) makes his first major league start Tuesday night against Brewers RHP Zach Davies (5-3, 5.33 ERA). Pill was called up from the minors Friday and lost in relief during his big league debut the following night at Pittsburgh. Davies is 2-0 with a 4.41 ERA in three career starts against New York, including an 11-4 win over Gsellman on May 13 at Miller Park.

Mets say Matz, Lugo will each make another rehab start

NEW YORK (AP) — Steven Matz and Seth Lugo are each scheduled to make one more rehab start in the minors before joining the New York Mets' rotation.

In another injury update, general manager Sandy Alderson said Monday the team hopes slugger Yoenis Cespedes will be ready to come off the disabled list in a week to 10 days — perhaps in time to be the designated hitter during a two-game series at Texas that begins June 6.

"That's conjecture at this point," Alderson explained.

Cespedes has been on the DL since April 28 with a strained left hamstring. He felt soreness in his right quadriceps while running the bases in his first rehab game Friday night for Class A St. Lucie and the club decided to hold him out until at least Tuesday.

"We think (it) is sort of a residual consequence of an injury last year," Alderson said. "He wanted to play Saturday night. We pulled him from that game and backed him up a little bit. Want to make sure that that quad injury is resolved before we took another step."

Matz and Lugo have been sidelined all season with elbow trouble, and each has made three minor league rehab appearances recently. They both started Sunday and threw more than 70 pitches, but the Mets want them to approach 90-plus before returning to the

majors.

Matz (left elbow inflammation) tossed five perfect innings for Triple-A Las Vegas, striking out eight against El Paso in a 73-pitch outing. Lugo (partial ligament tear in his right elbow) threw 79 pitches over six innings for Double-A Binghamton, allowing three runs and eight hits with seven strikeouts and two walks vs. Hartford.

Alderson said Matz will make another start for Las Vegas, while Lugo will stay at Binghamton.

If they do get back healthy

in early June, both are expected to move into the rotation immediately — probably pushing rookie Robert Gsellman into a struggling bullpen. Gsellman, who has made three relief appearances this season, got his ninth start Monday against Milwaukee and entered 2-3 with a 6.45 ERA overall.

"It's likely that Gsellman will go to the 'pen — and we do think he can help us there," Alderson said. "With a 5.00 ERA in the bullpen, a lot of people can help us."

New York's relief corps began the day ranked 26th in

the majors with a 4.90 ERA. Minus All-Star closer Jeurys Familia for much of the season, the Mets had converted only 10 of 19 save opportunities.

After being diagnosed with a blood clot, Familia had surgery May 12 to repair a blocked artery near his right armpit. He said Monday he expects to pitch again this season, but isn't sure if that means returning in August or September.

The right-hander said he hopes to start throwing after visiting the doctor for a checkup in two weeks.

New York also is missing

injured ace Noah Syndergaard and has turned to several mostly ineffective arms in trying to round out a once-imposing rotation. Next up, right-hander Tyler Pill is slated to make his first major league start Tuesday night against the Brewers — one day after his 27th birthday.

"It will definitely be exciting," he said. "I'm really looking forward to it."

Pill was called up from the minors last Friday and took the loss in relief during his big league debut Saturday night when he gave up the winning run in the 10th inning at Pittsburgh. He was a combined 4-1 with a 1.60 ERA in nine starts at Triple-A and Double-A.

NOT YOUR FAULT

After entering the season with lofty expectations and World Series aspirations, the injury-depleted Mets began play Monday with a 21-27 record. Contrary to some recent reports, however, Alderson said he doesn't blame manager Terry Collins for the slow start.

"I'm happy with the job that Terry has done under the circumstances," Alderson said. "Nobody's happy with the won-loss record that we have. I think there are reasons for the record that we have that have nothing to do with Terry. So I would hope in the future, that when people write about my views of Terry, that they'll actually ask me about my views."

Hinch not surprised by Astros success, but looking for more

HOUSTON (AP) — The Houston Astros have the best record in baseball and their best start in franchise history.

Surprising?
Not for the manager A.J. Hinch and these unflappable Astros. “I didn’t put any limitations on this team,” Hinch said. “So I don’t really have a baseline of how many games I expected to win.”

Pressed about whether anything about the Astros has surprised him this season, he contemplates the question for a few moments before slowly answering.

“Maybe the ability to hang in there when things aren’t going our way,” he said. “There’s a calmness about our team that has matured over the last year. I don’t know if that’s surprised me or if it’s just made me very proud.”

The calmness Hinch spoke of was on display on Monday when the Astros improved to 36-16 by overcoming a six-run deficit with an 11-run eighth inning for a 16-8 win over Minnesota. Their blistering start comes a year after a 7-17 mark put them in too big of a hole to climb out of, and they missed the playoffs a year after reaching the postseason for the first time since 2005.

Things are much different this season with ace Dallas Keuchel back to Cy Young form to lead the rotation and a lineup that has been producing from the leadoff spot all the way down to the ninth batter.

This, star shortstop Carlos Correa says is exactly what he envisioned entering the year.

“We’ve got a lot of talent in this room,” he said. “I feel like everywhere you look in the lineup there’s talent, there’s potential and we’ve got leadership now in this clubhouse. So we’re heading somewhere.”

Correa and second baseman Jose Altuve head a young core that was bolstered by the addition of veterans Carlos Beltran and Brian McCann this off-season. While everyone raves about what the infusion of their years of experience has done to this team, Beltran insists that leadership abounds in Houston.

“Altuve leads playing every day, Carlos Correa is a leader, Dallas Keuchel the leader in the rotation,” said Beltran, who is in his 20th season. “We all lead different ways. Me being the veteran guy on the team, maybe I have a little more experience than them but that doesn’t mean that I’m the only leader on this ball club.”

After going 9-12 in 26

starts in a disappointing 2016, Keuchel looks like he did — or perhaps even better — than in 2015 when he won a career-high 20 games and posted a career-best 2.48 ERA to pick up the American League Cy Young Award. He leads the majors with eight wins, is the first Astro since Roger Clemens in 2004 to open a season 8-0 and his 1.81 ERA ranks second in the majors.

The only thing that has slowed him down so far is a pinched nerve in his neck that cost him one start. But he didn’t miss a step in his return on Saturday night, allowing just four hits and one run in six innings for the win.

Altuve and Correa have led Houston’s hitters by both batting over .300 so far, but what’s been a boon to this team are the contributions the Astros have received from players at the bottom of the lineup. Super utility player Marwin Gonzalez is tied for the team lead with .311 average, his 32 RBIs lead the Astros and he’s tied with George Springer for most homers on the team with 11.

Outfielder Jake Marisnick, who has long been one of Houston’s top defenders, has stepped up on offense this season and is hitting .277 with six homers after hitting just five in 118 games last season.

“It’s a long lineup that’s dangerous,” Hinch said. “In some ways I feel like I’m hiding them down there at the bottom because their performances have warranted a little bit higher, but I can’t get these guys in the top of the order very easily.”

Obviously talent has played a major role in Houston’s success so far. But many around this team believe there’s something else that has pushed the Astros to another level this season.

“We’re united,” Beltran said. “We’re having fun in the clubhouse ... we believe in each other. We know what kind of team we have. We know the kind of talent that we have. So I think that being relaxed in the clubhouse has allowed us to go out there and perform.”

With a double-digit lead in the AL West, the Astros are in a great position for a return to the postseason. But with more than 100 games left they know their hot start won’t matter if they don’t keep it up.

“The one thing we won’t do around here is look at what we’ve done and celebrate too much,” Hinch said. “We’ve got to look forward.”

Like Shaun Livingston, JaVale McGee perfect fit on Warriors

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — JaVale McGee practices 3-pointers from all around the arch, just in case. He sits with assistant coach Jarron Collins and a laptop to study film, long after practice and his shooting workouts are complete.

The 7-footer's rugged professional path has landed him at seemingly the perfect stop: in the Bay Area with the NBA's best.

Just don't call him a journeyman.

"I've never considered myself a journeyman in the first place," McGee said after a practice this weekend. "Whatever y'all want to call me y'all can call me. The number of teams I've been on was in like one year. I've been with three teams in two years."

Yet McGee must not look far to find someone else who has learned to thrive as a well-traveled NBA role player. Just a quick glance a couple of lockers down to where Shaun Livingston dresses at Oracle Arena, defying the odds yet again this season as a regular reserve contributing to another Warriors championship chase, is all it takes.

McGee has never made it this far, an NBA Finals first-timer when Golden State hosts defending champion Cleveland in Game 1 on Thursday night. Livingston never should have made it this far, and here he is back to the final round seeking his second title in three seasons — and 10 years after a devastating injury that could have sidelined him for good. Doctors thought they might have to amputate his left leg.

Fourteen teams between them, over 21 combined seasons. Each has found a great groove in Golden State's rotation, called upon to take pressure off the big stars while maintaining the highest level.

"We just kind of follow suit, but it's up to everybody to come in and lock in on the details. It's the playoffs," Livingston said. "Obviously the stars help, they get all the headlines deservedly so, but the small things, the details, that's what we lock in at and that's how we win ballgames."

McGee has discovered the ideal place to shine as an alley-oop specialist in a pass-happy offense, and even Stephen Curry admits it's so easy to

target the sure-handed big man perhaps the Warriors do so too often at times.

"We almost get in trouble because we try to do it too much even if it's not there, because

he has the ability to catch it really anywhere around the rim, around the backboard," Curry acknowledged. "You kind of see it developing when he gets a free lane to the rim, and as a passer in that situation literally feel the most confidence that if I just get it anywhere up there, he'll go get it, and usually he does."

With great efficiency, too.

In Game 3 against the Spurs, McGee scored a postseason-best 16 points, all in the first half to get Golden State going as Zaza Pachulia sat out with a bruised heel. He made all seven of his shots in Game 2 of a first-round win against Portland, shooting 18 for 23 in all in the four-game sweep of the Trail Blazers.

"That's my whole thing, I just try to be efficient out there," McGee said. "I don't try to do too much. I just try to do what's necessary for me in the minutes that I'm out there."

Livingston has unselfishly dealt with a diminished role, a rotation change late in the season that altered when he's used, and then a hand injury in the first round of the playoffs.

In February 2007 with the Clippers, Livingston tore three major ligaments in his knee — the anterior cruciate, posterior cruciate and medial collateral as well as his lateral meniscus, then required extensive surgery. Though the injury could

have ended his career at age 21, he still believed he would play again. First he had to walk again.

"Shaun, that story isn't really the same now. He's become a staple of this franchise, he's helped us win a title, he's done some great things here," Draymond Green said. "For JaVale, it's still fresh, to where I think it's a great situation for him. He's finally been put in a position where he can do what he do. He's finally come to an organization, a first-class organization, that has embraced him for him and not tried to make him something that he's not. I think that has been pretty special, just seeing his growth over the course of the year, how he's been able to thrive. ... It's special to see when you take the path that they've taken to get to this moment."

McGee will have to help keep Cleveland's Tristan Thompson off the boards. His teammates know he's up to the task.

"It just speaks to his kind of character and perseverance and work ethic and his belief in himself that when he's out there on the floor he deserves to be out there on the floor, he belongs and can make an impact," Curry said. "When he showed up here, he understood the opportunity and he's taken full advantage of it. It's great to see."
